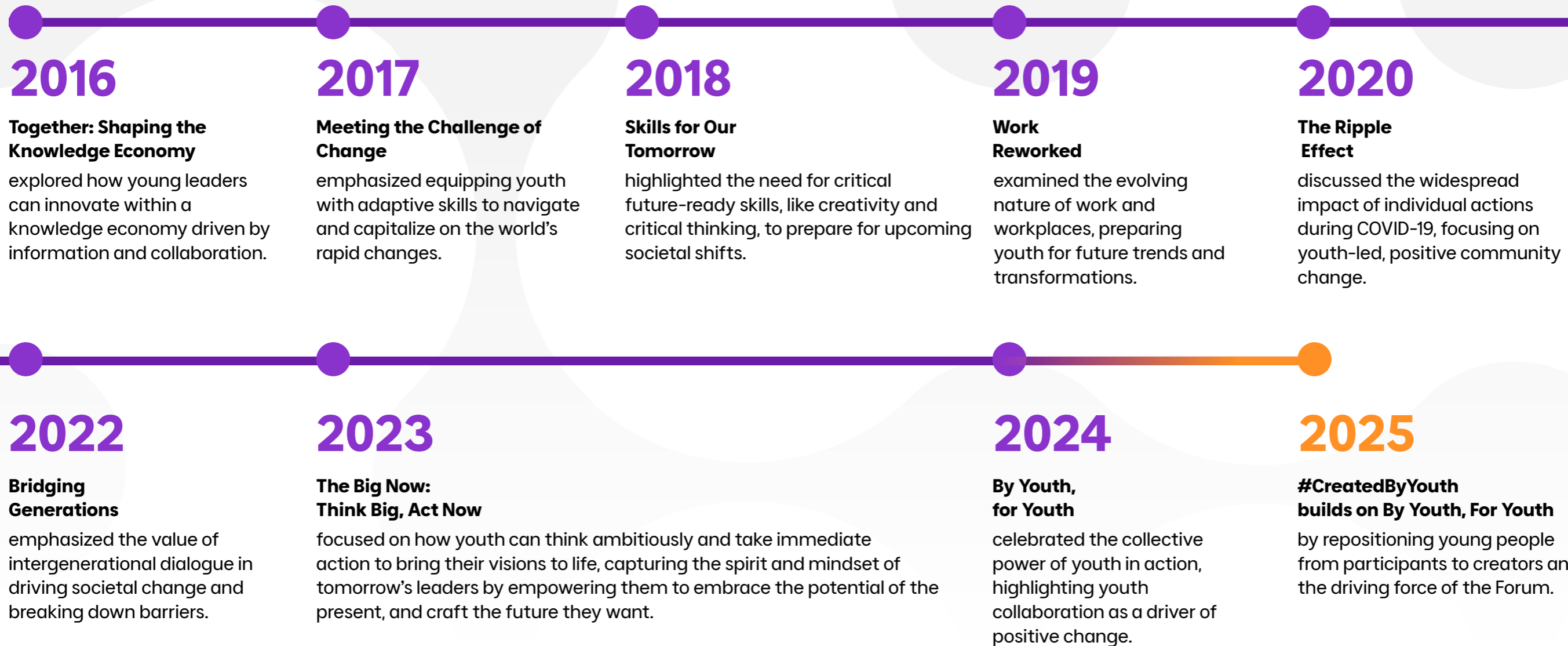

Opening Remarks

From The CEO of MISK Foundation

Writing is one of humanity's greatest inventions. Through it, we returned to the past and set our course for the future. We shaped ideas, told stories, and gave meaning to the world. Writing moved from stone inscriptions to leather, to pen and paper, to a keyboard and screen. Algorithms and AI are changing the game. Behind every screen, behind every algorithm, is always a human being. Tools do not create on their own. It is the human mind that imagines, questions, and invents.

You are here today not by chance. You came here willingly to contribute to a space that celebrates creativity. You are role models, today for yourselves, tomorrow for others.

Welcome to the Misk Global Forum. Welcome to the city of dreamers. Welcome to Misk City. This forum began with a simple, but powerful, mission: to empower young people, highlight their role models, and connect them to the world. Each year, we explore a new dimension of that mission. This year, we're focused on creativity. But what does creativity mean now?

In Japan, a prize-winning novelist revealed she used AI in her writing. In the United States, a digital artwork created with AI won a major competition. Around the world, millions were moved by a song, only to later discover it was entirely AI-generated. Some saw this as the end of creativity.

At Misk, we see it differently. The tools always change, but the essence of creativity is constant and that is the human being. We're facing a new era of creativity. Humans do not compete with technology, but unite with it. This year, 30,000 young people have gathered here to listen to 300 speakers from 80 countries across 150 sessions. 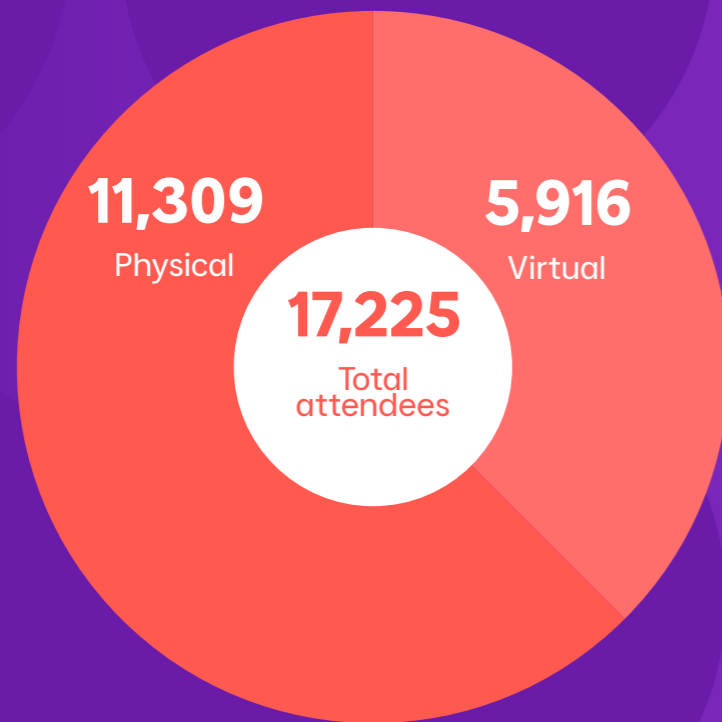

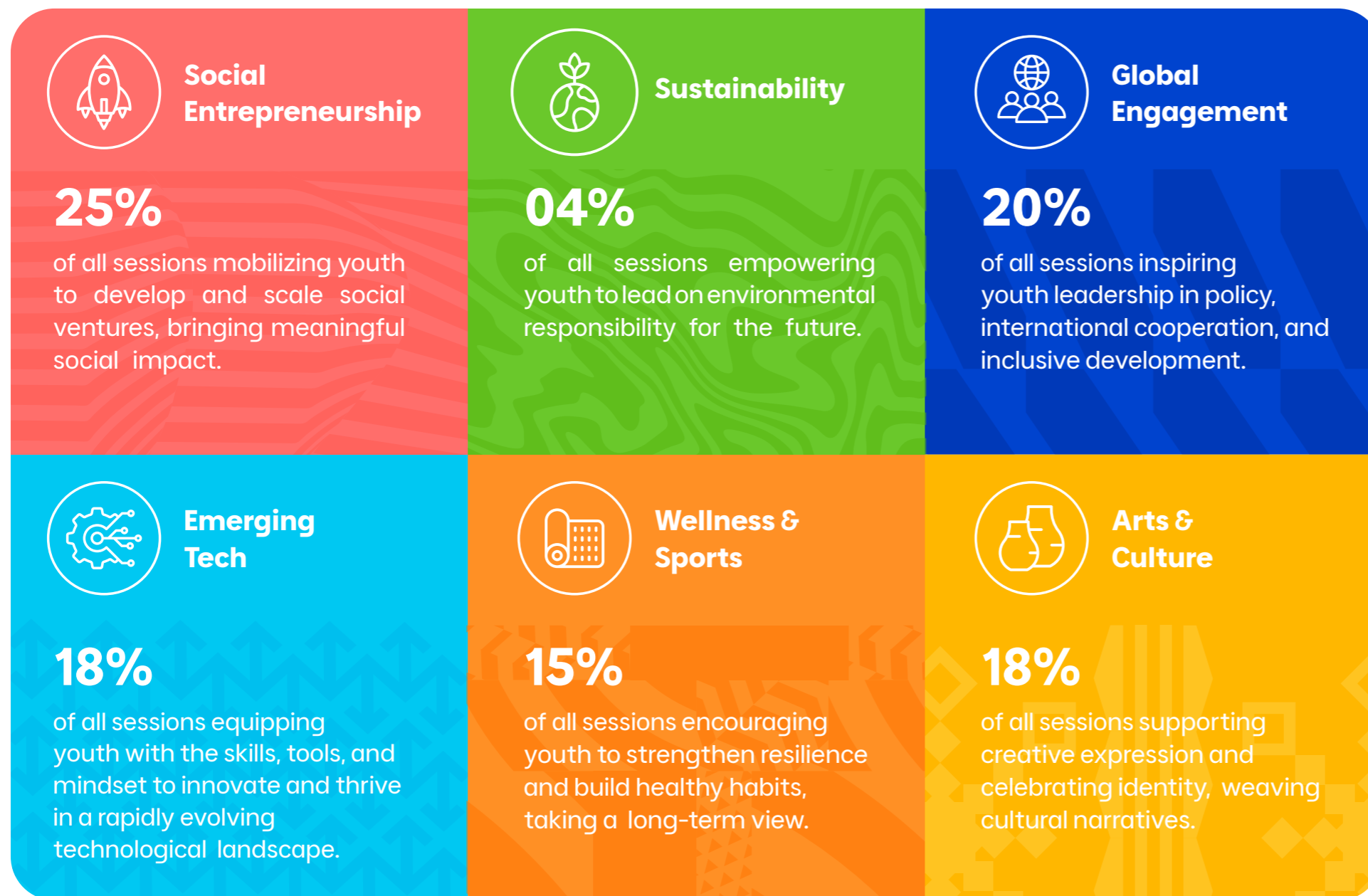

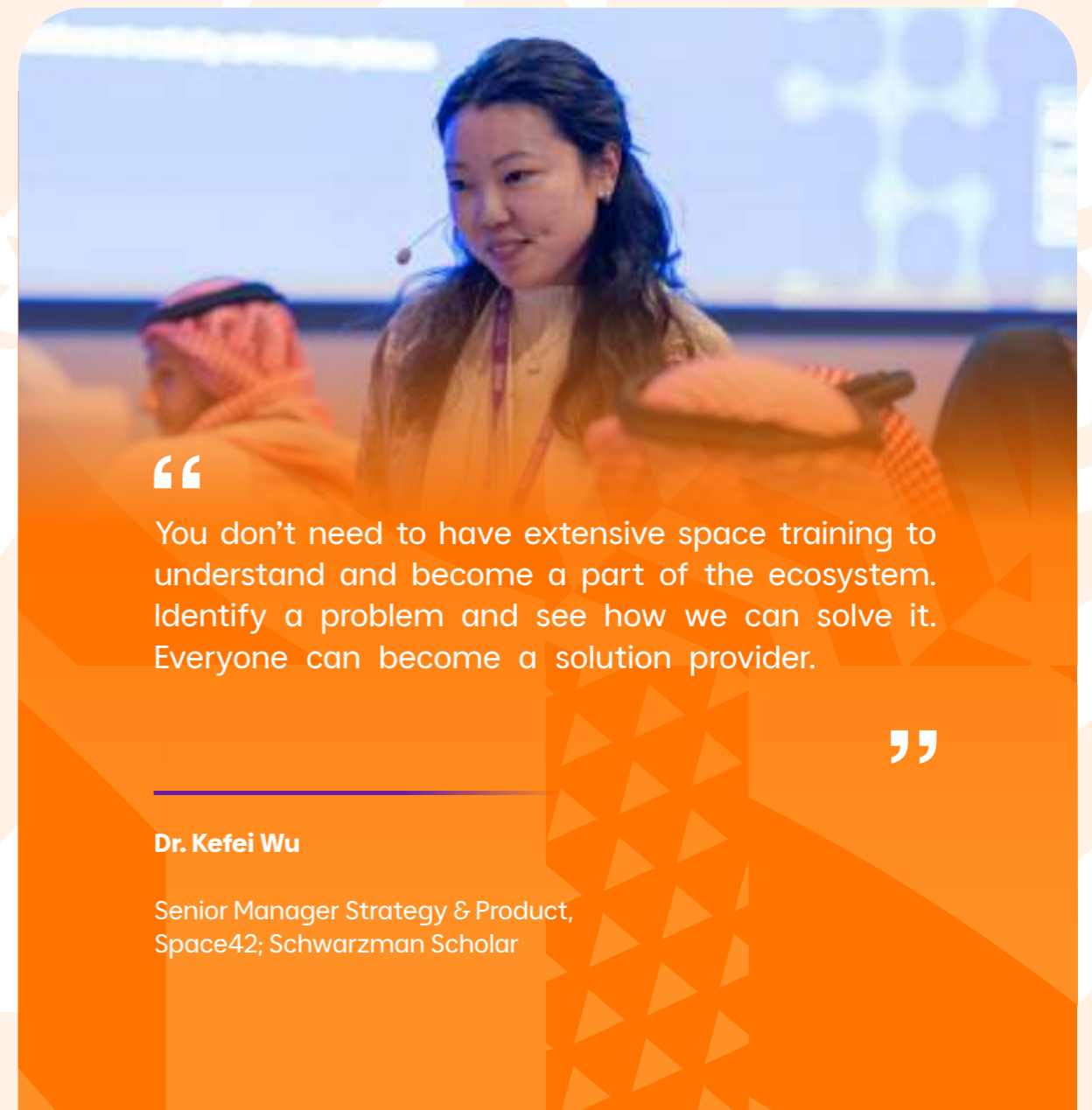

Space 180° – Collaboration Lab

YOUTH LEAD NOW - Powered by: World Scouting

This hands-on session gathered participants to understand collective leadership through play, dialogue, and storytelling.

Focusing on action and advocacy, participants tested tools and worked with peers to translate ideas into practical plans, ready for immediate use.



Key Messages Youth Walked Away With

- Symbolic gestures, such as inviting youth to speak or appear on panels, do not constitute meaningful inclusion. Young people seek roles where they can influence decisions and initiatives, advocating for change over providing commentary.
- While numerous youth programs build confidence and provide valuable skills, not all lead to meaningful leadership. The quality and depth of empowerment varies. Some initiatives stop at participation, short of real impact.
- Action, advocacy, and inspiration form a holistic model of youth leadership. When young people act on issues they identify, advocate with evidence and clarity, and inspire others through visible engagement, leadership becomes practical and effective.
- Young people are not only the leaders of tomorrow, but the leaders of today. Given the right platforms and opportunities, they can influence systems and policy as well as inspire the next generation now.

This session assembled young Saudi and international change makers for open dialogue and collaborative challenges with business, philanthropy, and policy leaders.



Key Messages Youth Walked Away With

- Leadership readiness is no longer determined by age. Technology and AI have democratized access to knowledge, allowing young people to build expertise faster and challenge traditional structures of authority.
- Empowering youth requires recognizing more than age alone. Factors such as language, mobility, privilege, and representation make inclusion a matter of access and shared responsibility.
- Youth leadership is strengthened when hope is linked to systems awareness and accountability. Understanding structures and committing to mentorship and knowledge-sharing enables sustainable impact.
- Young people are already creating the future across regions. Through curiosity, self-directed learning, and action, they are building ventures, influencing narratives, and leading without waiting for permission.

Space 180° – Creation Lab



The Creation Lab is a hands-on space where young creators convert their ideas into working prototypes.

Guided by mentors, teams move quickly from defining a challenge to building and testing solutions, simultaneously refining their narrative and business model.

Participants leave with a tangible prototype and clearer direction to carry their developing momentum beyond MGF25, with selected teams receiving prototype support vouchers.

Space 180°'s Creation Lab culminated in 32 creations

Creation Highlight

Youth developed a fully integrated prototype in the form of a smart medication organizer.

Key Outcomes

- Participants learned how to build business models and investment pitches.
- Participants engaged with the Innovation Center's virtual lab to transform ideas into tangible prototypes.
- Participants learned simplified digital and physical business model templates to support the development of their own models.

Key Messages Youth Walked Away With

- Diplomacy works by temporarily setting aside personal identity to represent national interests, forcing participants to understand trade-offs and incentives beyond their own views. This role-shift builds empathy and strategic thinking, instigating appreciation for why global agreements are slow but necessary.
- Consensus is built through language. Small changes in wording can yield agreement, revealing how global outcomes are often the result of precision, compromise, and persistence, not blanket ideological wins.
- Global environmental problems expose unequal capacities and effects. While some countries contribute little to pollution, they suffer disproportionately, underlining the need for fair financing, capacity building, and differentiated responsibility embedded directly into international commitments.
- Effective multilateral action requires lifecycle thinking. Addressing microplastics demands coordinated solutions across production, use, waste management, technology transfer, monitoring, and community engagement, indicating how environmental challenges cannot be solved by single policies or isolated national efforts.

Skills Lab equipped youth with future-ready skills through hands-on, expert-led learning. Practical workshops focused on real-world application, building confidence and capability outliving the forum.

Skills Lab engaged participants with timely, future-focused topics, highlighted by the Hover & Discover session, powered by 966IHUB.

SKILLS LAB - Sessions were powered by **19 Partners**



Hover & Discover

Participants learned about the world of racing drones and how they operate and maneuver at high speeds.

Guided by expert mentors, they built a foundational understanding of drone technology and piloted a DJI Avata 2 in a safe, engaging environment, compounding teamwork and creativity with hands-on innovation.

Skills Lab emerged as the highest-rated experience at MGF, earning the strongest satisfaction scores from participants.

The programme opened with a dynamic exchange led by visionary youth. Drawing on diverse perspectives, changemakers framed the guiding question of MGF25: If youth are to shape the future, what needs to change first?

Takeaways

1. Youth creativity expands when boundaries haven't yet been learned, allowing problems to be seen as solvable and possibilities to feel open, unlimited by assumptions.
2. Progress happens only when ideas move from intention to action. Experimenting, failing, adjusting, and trying again are what convert inspiration into tangible outcomes.
3. Those who deliberately search for answers accelerate their growth. Skills, knowledge, and tools are widely accessible to anyone willing to seek, learn, and self-equip.
4. Impact grows through communication and connection. Sharing a vision clearly and engaging mentors, peers, and institutions strengthens ideas and brings them to life.
5. Transformation often begins with small, persistent steps. Quiet effort, resilience, and repeated attempts create momentum long before breakthroughs become visible.

Takeaways

1. Vision alone is not enough. What distinguishes the Saudi model is the speed of implementation and the ability to translate ambition into visible results.
2. While Riyadh is a major hub, real opportunity exists across regions and villages in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, when local strengths, culture, and geography are understood and leveraged.
3. Regions like Hail demonstrate that nature, culture, population reach, and identity can be competitive advantages instead of limitations.
4. Innovation begins with insight. Understanding demand, context, and purpose determines whether ideas scale and endure.
5. Young people are encouraged to see their projects as serving the country first, with personal success following as a result.

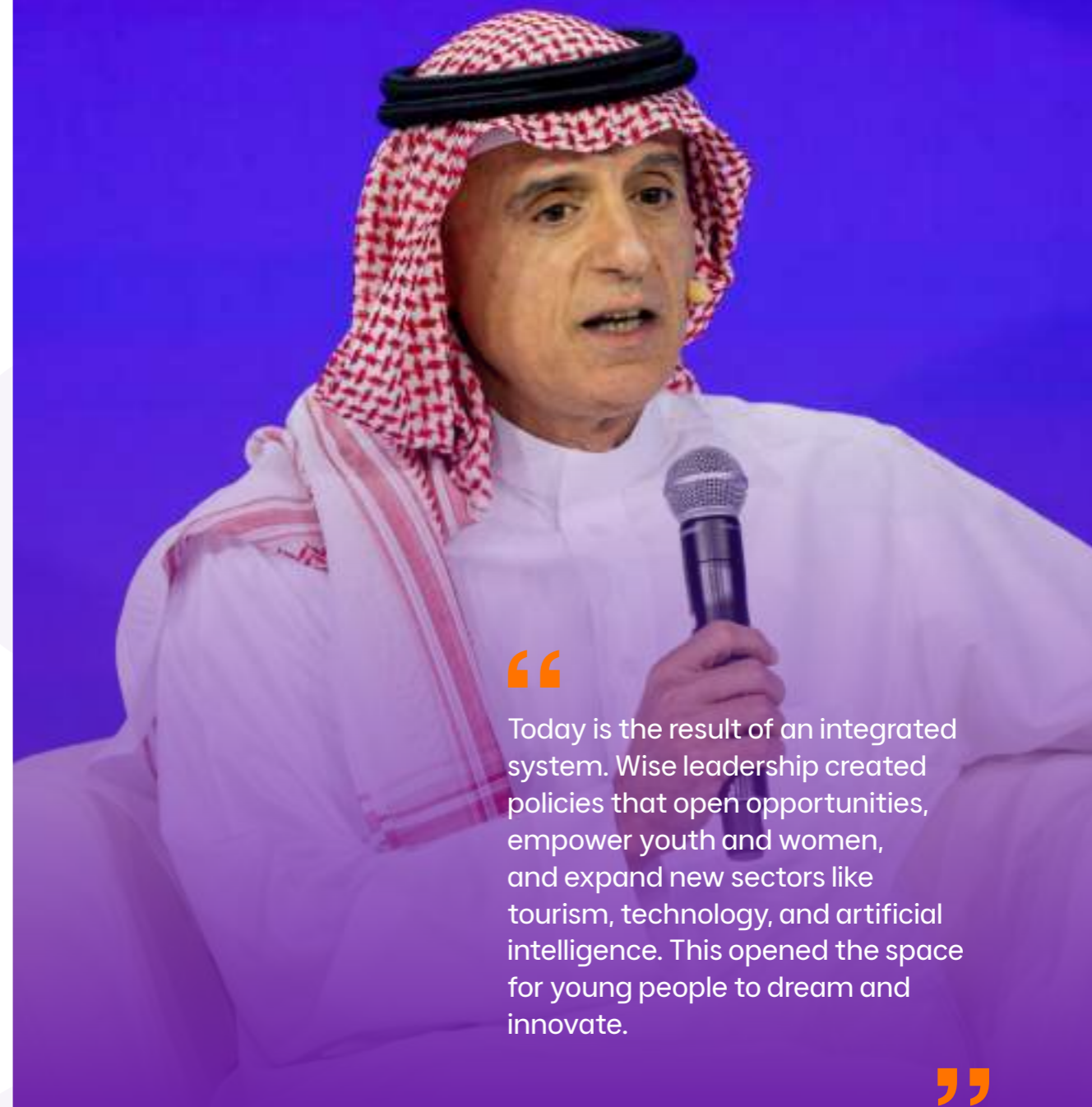

Takeaways

1. Saudi Arabia's internal reforms under Vision 2030 have directly improved its international standing, shifting global perception from expectation to admiration.
2. Through education, digital presence, creativity, and everyday conduct, young Saudis actively shape the Kingdom's global image, often more powerfully than formal diplomatic channels.
3. Leadership vision, enabling policies, economic diversification, and social openness function as one system, creating real space for innovation, education, ambition, talent, and values are the foundation of Saudi Arabia's competitiveness across diplomacy, economy, and society.
4. Innovation in culture, technology, and thought is positioned as a modern diplomatic force, capable of building alliances, trust, and long-term influence beyond traditional tools.

In this session, H.R.H. Abdulaziz bin Turki Al Faisal Al Saud presented how Saudi youth stand at the heart of the Kingdom's sporting transformation as athletes, leaders, organizers, and creators shaping a vibrant future. This session highlighted inspiring success stories, expanding opportunities, and the growing ecosystem that empowers young people to turn potential into lasting creations.

Takeaways

1. Youth are the central force behind the future of the sports sector as athletes as well as in administrative, finance, marketing, and leadership roles.
2. Vision 2030 has expanded the sports ecosystem greatly, creating new opportunities requiring youth to actively step forward to claim them.
3. Achievement in sport and beyond is framed as a result of persistence, sacrifice, and sustained effort rather than waiting for ideal conditions or immediate success.
4. Real examples of Saudi athletes demonstrate that setbacks and nontraditional paths do not limit long-term potential when commitment and discipline are maintained.
5. Youth are encouraged to remain adaptable, continuously educate themselves, and view competition as a driver for personal growth and national contribution.

With the AI takeover looming large, have we truly reached the edge of what the human mind can handle? Or are we only just beginning to discover our full potential? In this session, prodigy Aaryan “The Human Calculator” Shukla amazed attendees with live feats of mental mathematics, setting the stage for a broader exploration of what defines intelligence in an age of algorithms. Joined by Muhammad Siddiqui and Ann Makosinski, the discussion examined where creativity, curiosity, and emotion fit as machines grow more capable. Is technology replacing human brilliance—or are tools like AI unlocking entirely new dimensions of it?

Takeaways

1. Human potential can expand when dedication meets discipline, showing that exceptional ability often emerges from consistent daily effort. Talent alone will not suffice.
2. Young people gain a unique advantage from fearless experimentation. They try, fail, adjust, and try again, often without the hesitation that slows adults, making youth a powerful period for exploration and accelerated learning.
3. Human intelligence remains distinct in empathy, creativity, intuition, and emotional understanding. These uniquely human traits form the foundation of the innovation that AI cannot replicate.
4. Coexisting with AI requires embracing tools that increase efficiency, speed, and experimentation while sharpening the soft skills that differentiate humans. Those who learn to use AI as a co-pilot will accelerate ahead.
5. Youth thrive when given platforms like Misk Global Forum that amplify their voices, connect them globally, and encourage them to turn personal skill into public impact.

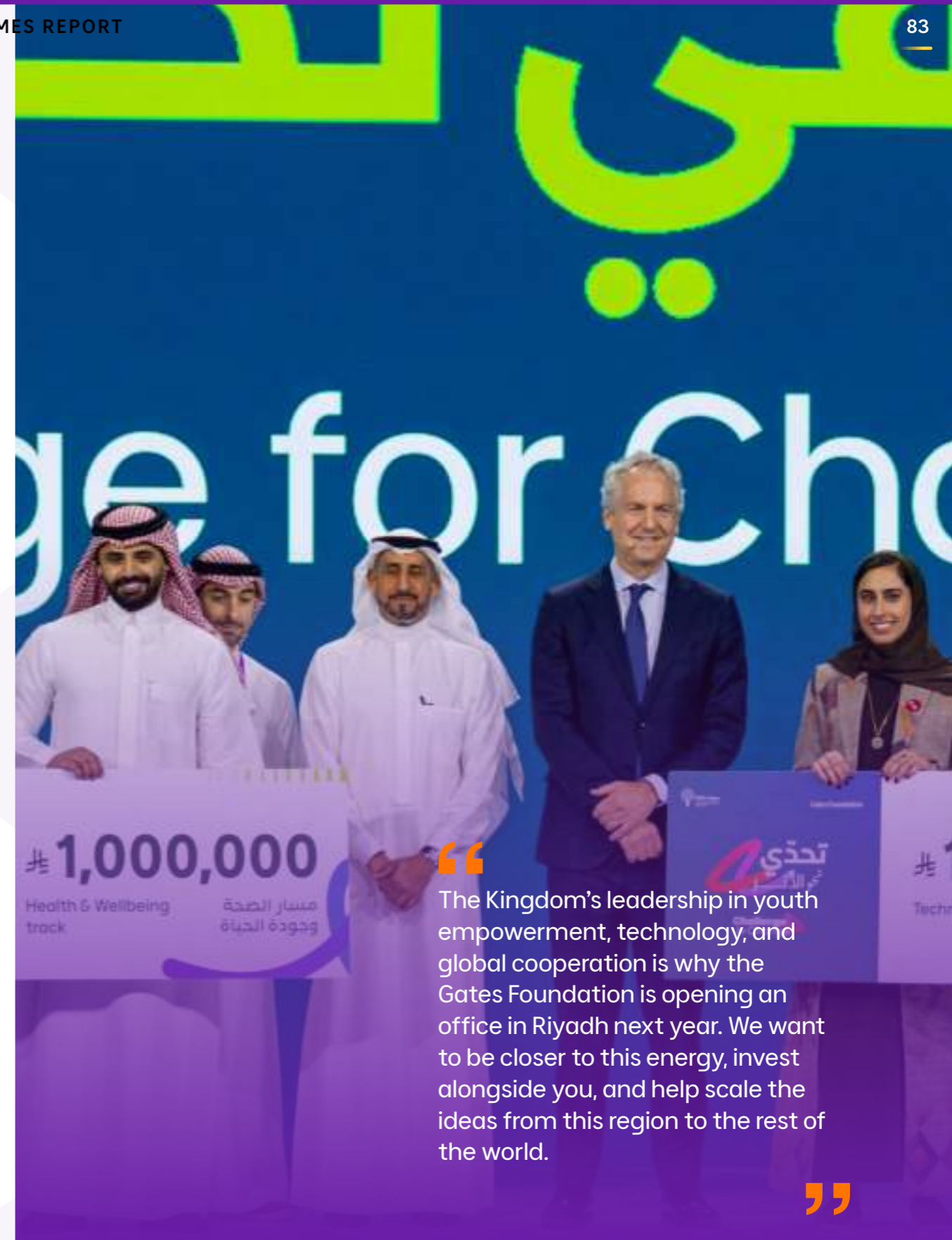

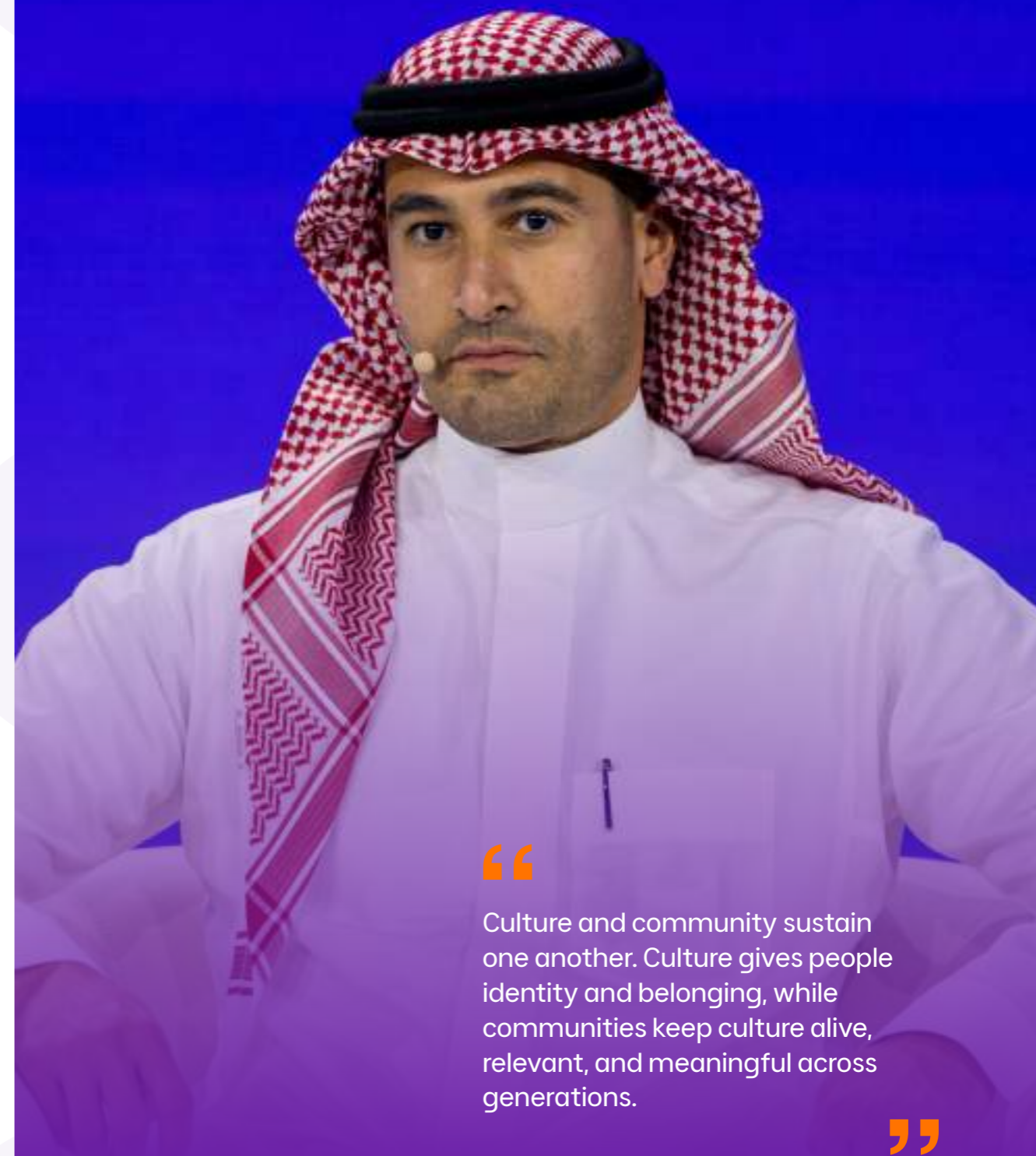

5. Ethical responsibility must advance alongside technology. Science-based, adaptive regulation is needed to prevent misuse while enabling innovation, ensuring powerful tools like biotechnology and AI contribute to solving global challenges instead of creating new risks.

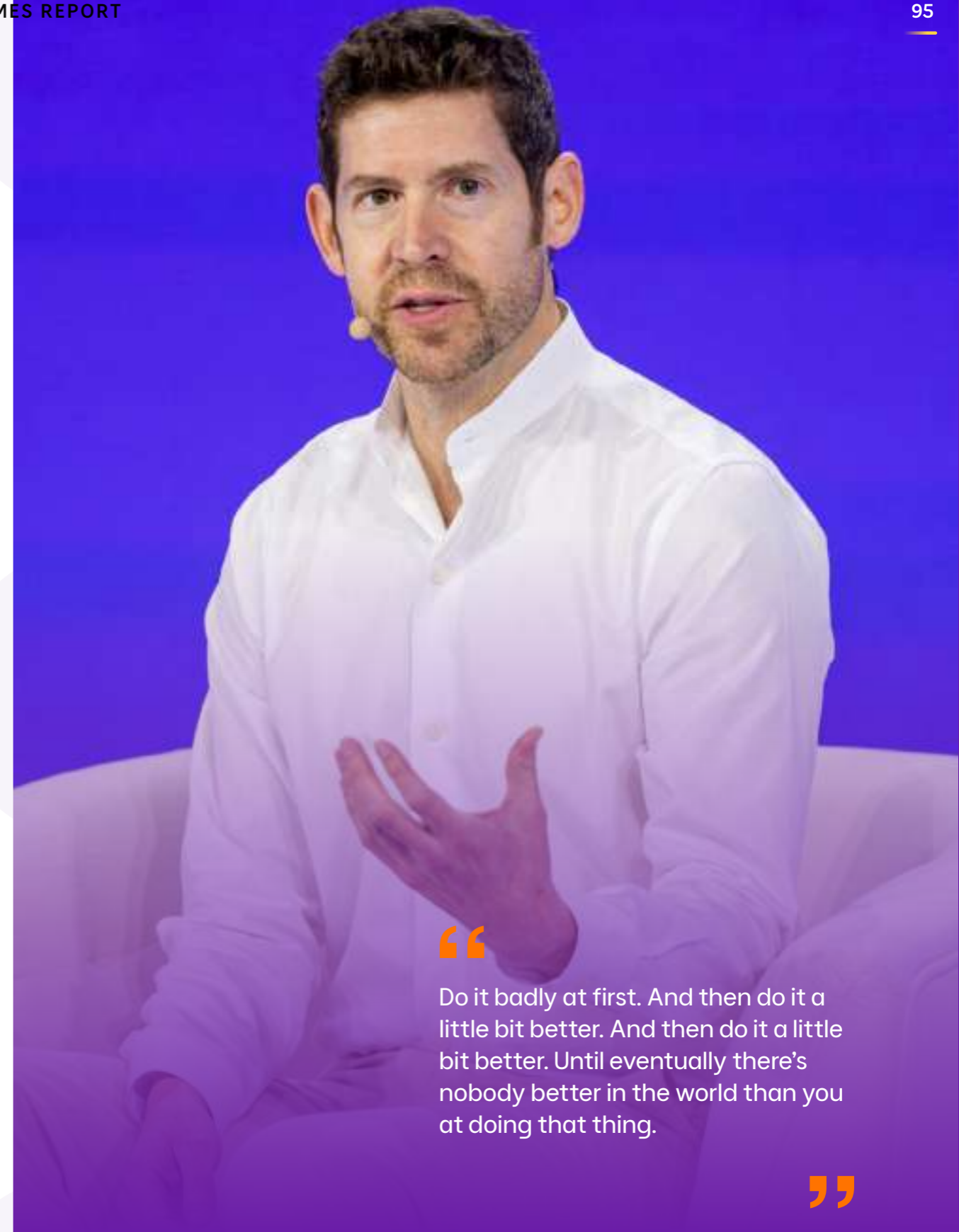

Takeaways

1. Open source lowers barriers to entry by removing the need for permission, allowing anyone with internet access to build, publish, and gain visibility regardless of age or background.

3. Future tech leadership will rely on project thinking over task execution, especially as AI automates more predefined work.

Sleepwalk To Success

Teenagers don't just like to sleep late; science shows that early school times are a mismatch for their natural rhythms and that we can actually improve test scores, reduce depression, and cut accident rates by rethinking our relationship with rest. Attendees explored the benefits of sleep as a performance tool, hearing how youth creators are hacking their hibernation, investigating what would be possible if the next generation could reimagine our world to align with biology, not an alarm clock.

Takeaways

1. Modern productivity is capped by biological misalignment. Chronic sleep deprivation, overstimulation, and sedentary routines leave people operating at full capacity, but below full potential, eroding presence, attention, emotional regulation, and sustained performance across learning, work, and relationships.
2. Sleep is an active performance multiplier. Quality sleep improves memory recall, complex problem-solving, emotional resilience, and stress regulation, with light sleep playing a critical role in psychological reset, brain cleansing, and long-term cognitive health, especially for young people.
3. High performance depends on strategic recovery. Aligning work, learning, and rest with natural circadian rhythms (through structured sleep cycles, naps, and focused work-rest intervals) reduces burnout, increases output quality, and mirrors the habits of elite performers across disciplines.
4. Stress is inevitable, but resilience is trainable. Tools such as breathwork, movement, nature exposure, and controlled stress training can rapidly downregulate fight-or-flight responses, restore cognitive capacity, and build long-term tolerance for pressure without sacrificing clarity or decision-making.
5. Learning, growth, and innovation are wired during rest, not effort alone. Sleep enables neuroplasticity, allowing failure to convert into learning, insight, and progress. Instead of casting them as luxuries, it renders rest, reflection, and self-care as foundational to creativity, adaptability, and long-term success.

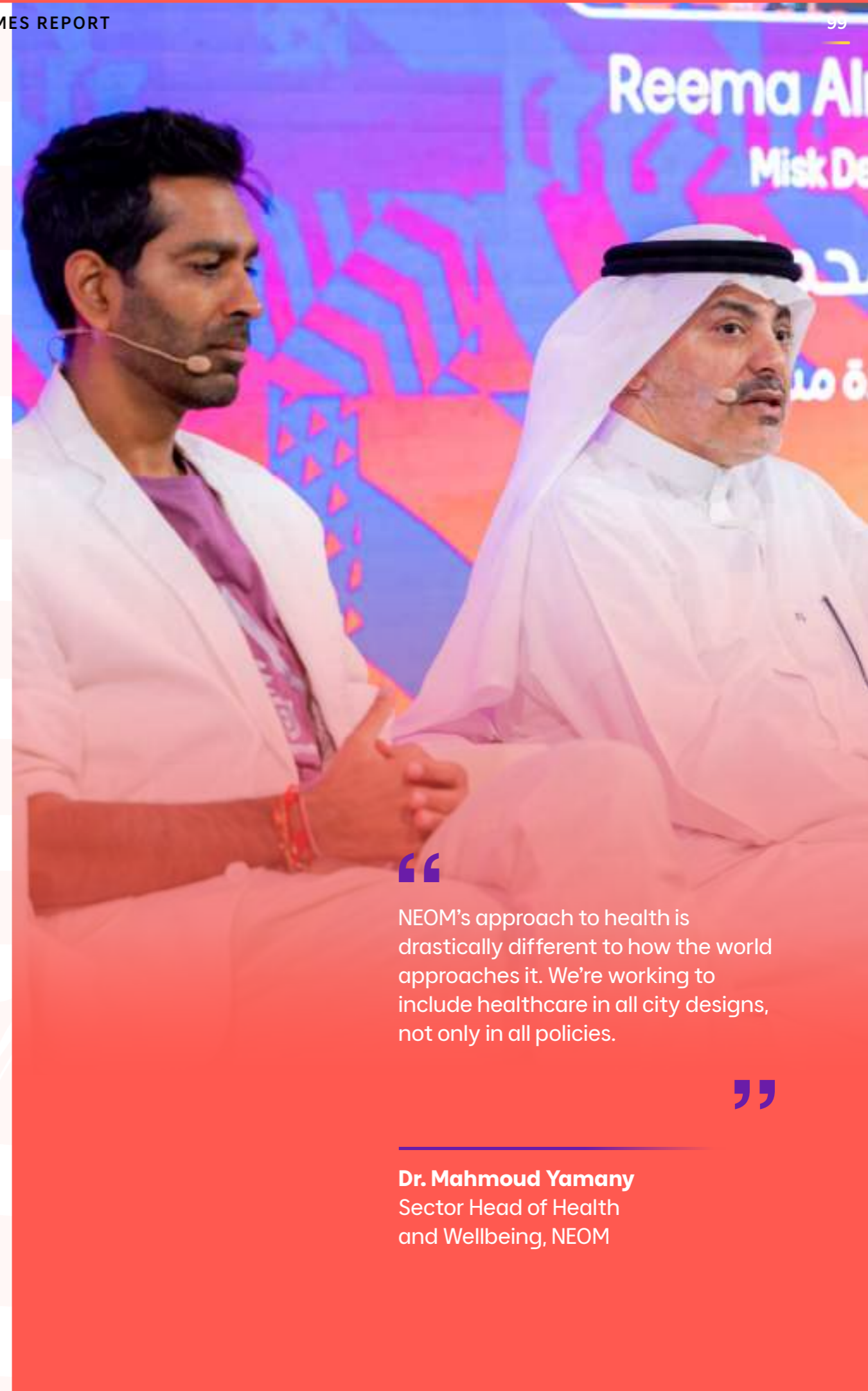

Social entrepreneur Akshai Sarin and NEOM health head Dr. Mahmoud Yamany shared lessons from their global, industry-defying journeys of impact and infrastructure, equipping the next generation with new ideas and practical frameworks to drive quality of life as the true bottom line.

Takeaways

1. NEOM is reframing healthcare around prevention, not treatment counts, by building computational avatars for residents, comparing them to disease digital twins, predicting long-horizon risk, and intervening early to add healthy and happy years.
2. Health is embedded into NEOM's design, from daylight and sleep optimization to nature access, sensors, and continuous experimentation personalized to each resident, centering individual well-being.
3. Financial sustainability is essential for mission-driven work, and leadership culture reflects the leader's inner state.
4. Meditation can be used as an operating tool, with daily practice to improve clarity, reduce reactivity, and protect decision quality, reinforcing that management and employee well-being directly affect company outcomes.

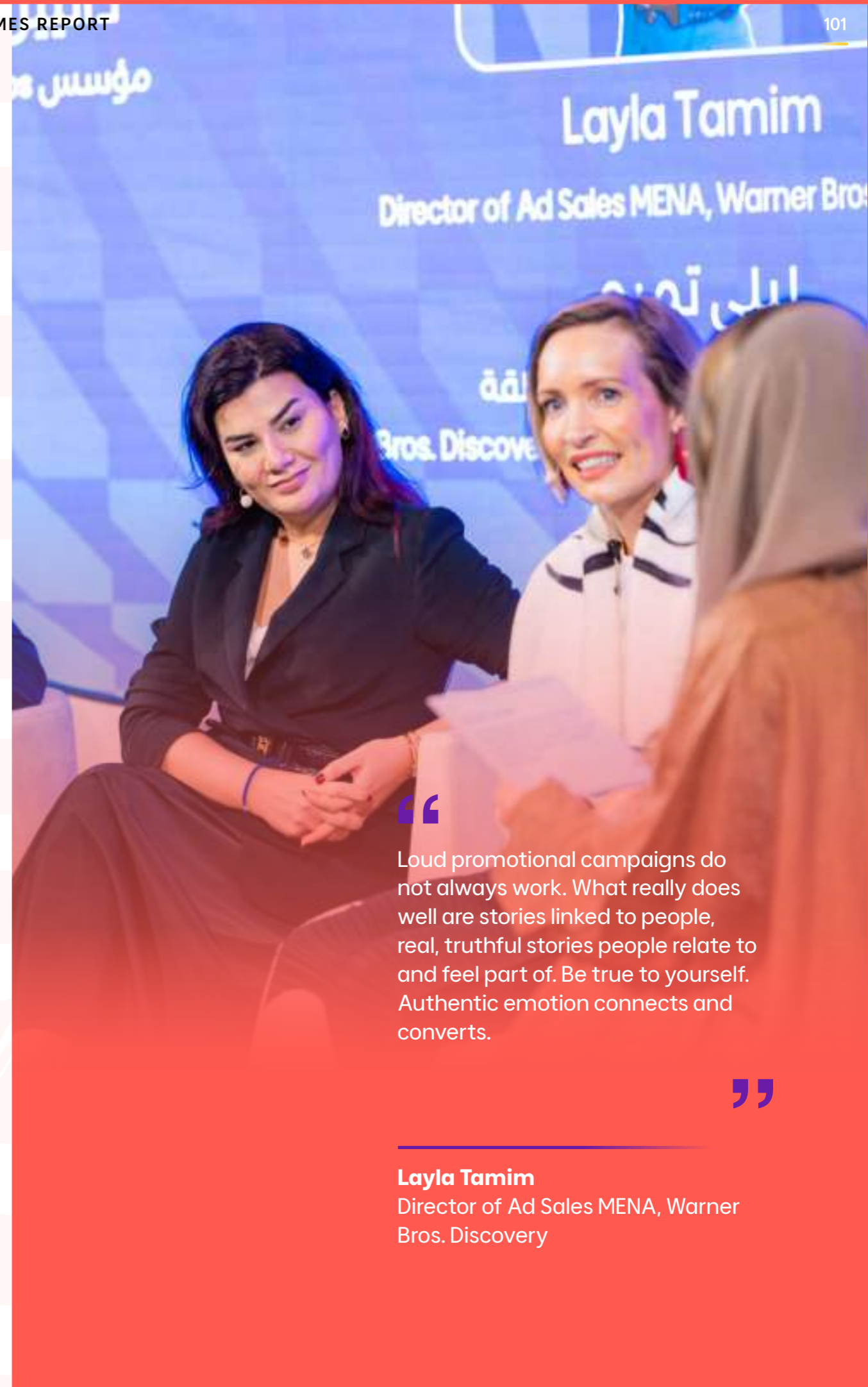

In this age of information overload, it's not always the best idea that gains traction—it's the best story. Wherever ideas are pitched or promoted, all too often the audience gets lost in the detail and is left wondering why it matters. This session brought together top-tier storytellers who weaved a conversation around the power of narrative and how young leaders can transform raw concepts into compelling threads.

Takeaways

1. Pitches persuade when they start with a strong why, the problem that truly matters to you, and then show solution, traction, next steps, and a clear ask. Facts alone do not move people; shared purpose does.
2. Stories that stick are authentic, emotional, and specific. Brands and audiences respond to truthful, relatable narratives that make people think, feel, and act, preferring them to one-size-fits-all templates or louder logos.
3. Storytelling is the foundation of influence. In uncertain contexts, the ability to make others believe in you through authentic emotion is a critical skill. Every big idea scales because one person shared a story that another chose to carry.

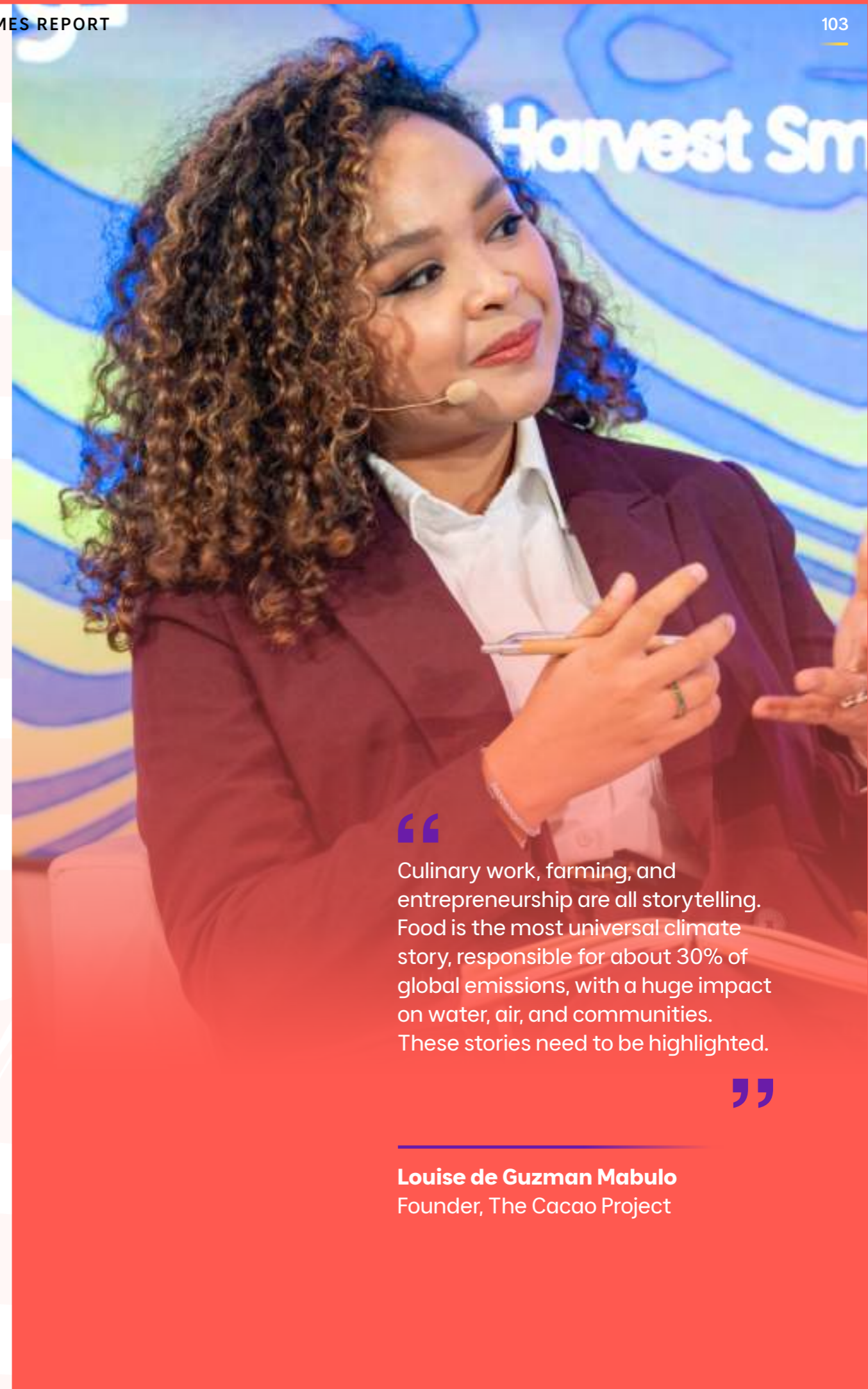

With desert climates and water scarcity ravaging multiple regions, how will the world feed itself in 2050? This timely session brought together leaders in sustainable farming, future food systems and community innovation. The discussion highlighted how youth projects are creating resilient crops, using tech for resource-smart farms, and turning agricultural waste into energy to fuel systemic change. It demonstrated how youth can future-proof the planet, from field to fuel to table.

Takeaways

1. Climate-resilient food systems start with producer economics: rebuilding after shocks works best when farmers gain profitable pathways, skills, and agency, becoming stewards and entrepreneurs, not just vulnerable suppliers, and when resilience scales through local ecosystems like agroforestry.
2. Tech can decouple food production from harsh climates, but adoption hinges on consumer trust and lived experience. Lead with taste, safety, and affordability first, then explain the precision behind it, turning “smart farming” from a concept into something people choose daily.
3. Agricultural waste is a climate and logistics problem disguised as “trash.” The breakthrough is processing residue where it sits; designing rugged, farmer-friendly tools that convert biomass into valuable products, reduce burning-driven pollution, and create new income streams without demanding unrealistic behavior change.
4. Build where the value chain is weakest; sustainable food innovation rewards focus, patience, and systems thinking. Start with a niche, validate unit economics, map networks for partners, and plan for real-world overruns in time and cost while iterating with users on the ground.

In an age where negativity and uncertainty are commonplace, how can young people cultivate the resilience and maturity needed to move toward true happiness? In this session, renowned self-development trainer Dr. Khalid Al-Munif highlighted the powerful force of radical optimism in shaping the next generation. Drawing on psychological principles and touching on subjects from emotional intelligence to achieving personal balance, he presented practical tools for building habits, reframing challenges, and pursuing purpose with clarity. This talk served as a reminder that real growth comes not from avoiding life's pressures, but from transforming them into strengths.

Takeaways

1. Optimism requires action. Real optimism means working toward change while trusting that outcomes beyond your control will ultimately be good.
2. Positivity reveals itself during crisis. Your true character and mental strength show up when you're facing difficulty.
3. Success comes from learning where to invest energy and where to cut losses. Leverage what others have already figured out, and don't be too proud to withdraw from situations that aren't giving you value.
4. Mental strength means processing emotions without being imprisoned by them. It's normal to feel pain, cry, or struggle. That's being human. The problem is dwelling excessively on past mistakes or losses instead of moving forward with each new day.

From grassroots leagues to global esports, sport innovation increasingly doesn't need big stadiums or superstar endorsements to succeed. This session brought together a bevy of best-in-class entrepreneurs and youth innovators who discussed how young people can build sticky communities, measure impact and turn passion for fitness, wellbeing and recreation into sustainable ventures. The discussion uncovered how community, inclusivity, and new technologies are reshaping sport, highlighting how to create a business that thrives on both purpose and profit.

Takeaways

1. Measuring impact doesn't require complexity or massive budgets. Start with a clear impact statement, track basic outputs, ask "so what" to identify change, and bring it to life with stories; measuring impact from the beginning is what makes you big.
2. Scale systems, not activity; build repeatable frameworks that others can deliver when you're gone, co-create with communities who will protect what they build, establish partnerships early, and develop revenue streams because profit protects purpose. 93% earned income beats grant dependency.
3. In the attention economy, success requires multiple daily attempts at engagement with short-form content, protecting your brand while taking shots, and building specific demonstrated skills through portfolios instead of relying on general knowledge or certificates alone.

A Mind-Set To Success

What does it really take to win, not just on the field, but in life? England and Manchester United legend Rio Ferdinand shared how the discipline, teamwork and resilience learned through sport can shape success in any arena. From early setbacks to global triumphs, Rio reflected on how football taught him the power of preparation, leadership and staying composed under pressure. Exploring how young people can build their own winning mindset, he explained how the next generation can be one defined, not by trophies, but by character, purpose and persistence.

Takeaways

1. Lasting youth impact requires mutual responsibility: older generations must create belief, access, and opportunity, while young people stay curious and act. When both sides engage, confidence replaces fear and ambition becomes tangible social contribution, with a nationwide scale.
2. Effective leadership is earned through example, not authority. Consistent work ethic, shared standards, and visible discipline build credibility faster than commands, especially under pressure. Actions signal values, invite trust, and allow teams to follow without being coerced by leaders daily.
3. Growth demands embracing pressure, spotlight, and imperfection; progress blooms from adjusting expectations, learning publicly, and persisting through mistakes. Defining personal success early, saying no to distractions, and protecting balance helps focus energy where long-term impact compounds over time sustainably consistently.
4. Vulnerability strengthens leadership and performance. Speaking openly about struggle normalizes support, deepens trust, and improves resilience. Mental health improves when people ask, listen, and model openness. Showing strength includes empathy, help-seeking, and the courage to be seen by teams everywhere collectively.

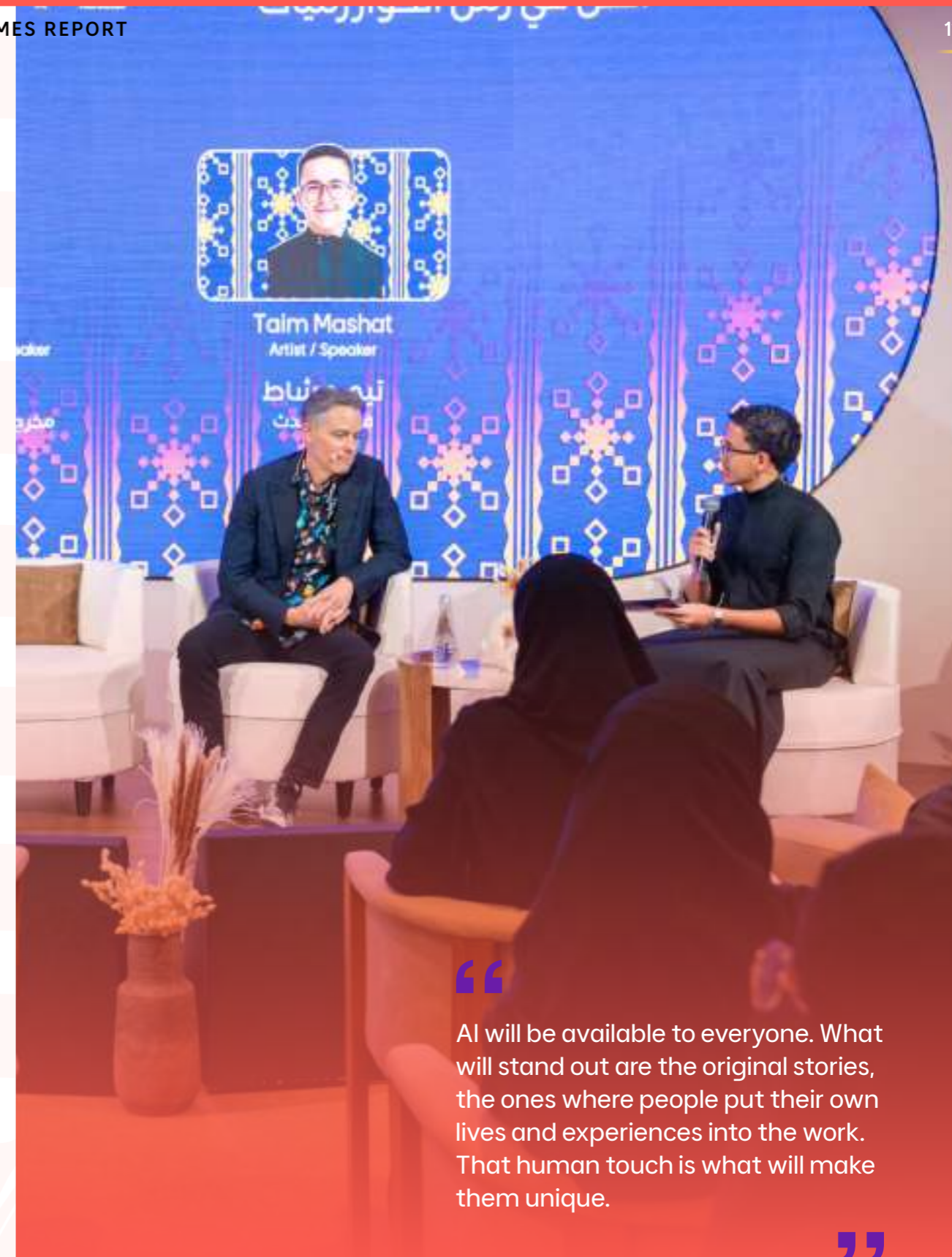

What happens to creativity when intelligence is artificial, tools are generative and art can be automated? Far from replacing artists, AI and emerging technologies are reshaping how young people can imagine, produce and share culture. Attendees joined Matthew Luhn, celebrated artist, animator, storyteller and veteran of Pixar and “The Simpsons”, in an intimate fireside chat that investigated the changing ways we create and distribute stories, with perspectives and practical advice on how the next-generation can harness these tools and build their own cultural projects with authenticity at the heart.

Takeaways

1. Creative success is often seeded early by immersion in imaginative environments and the permission to dream. Believing creativity can become a livelihood, before knowing how, builds the confidence to persist, take risks, and sustain a lifelong practice in storytelling and artistic problem-solving.
2. Technological shifts amplify creativity when paired with strong storytelling and artistic intent. From past innovations to AI today, tools only create lasting impact when they serve narrative clarity, emotional resonance, and human perspective in lieu of merely novelty.
3. As creative tools become universally accessible, originality becomes the true differentiator. What stands out is personal voice; embedding lived experience, cultural context, and unique perspective into familiar story structures to create work that feels authentic.
4. Enduring creativity requires persistence, ethical awareness, and a willingness to risk failure. Progress comes from embracing change, resisting creative complacency, and prioritizing meaningful ideas over safe repetition, whether as individuals or institutions, while keeping human values at the center of innovation.

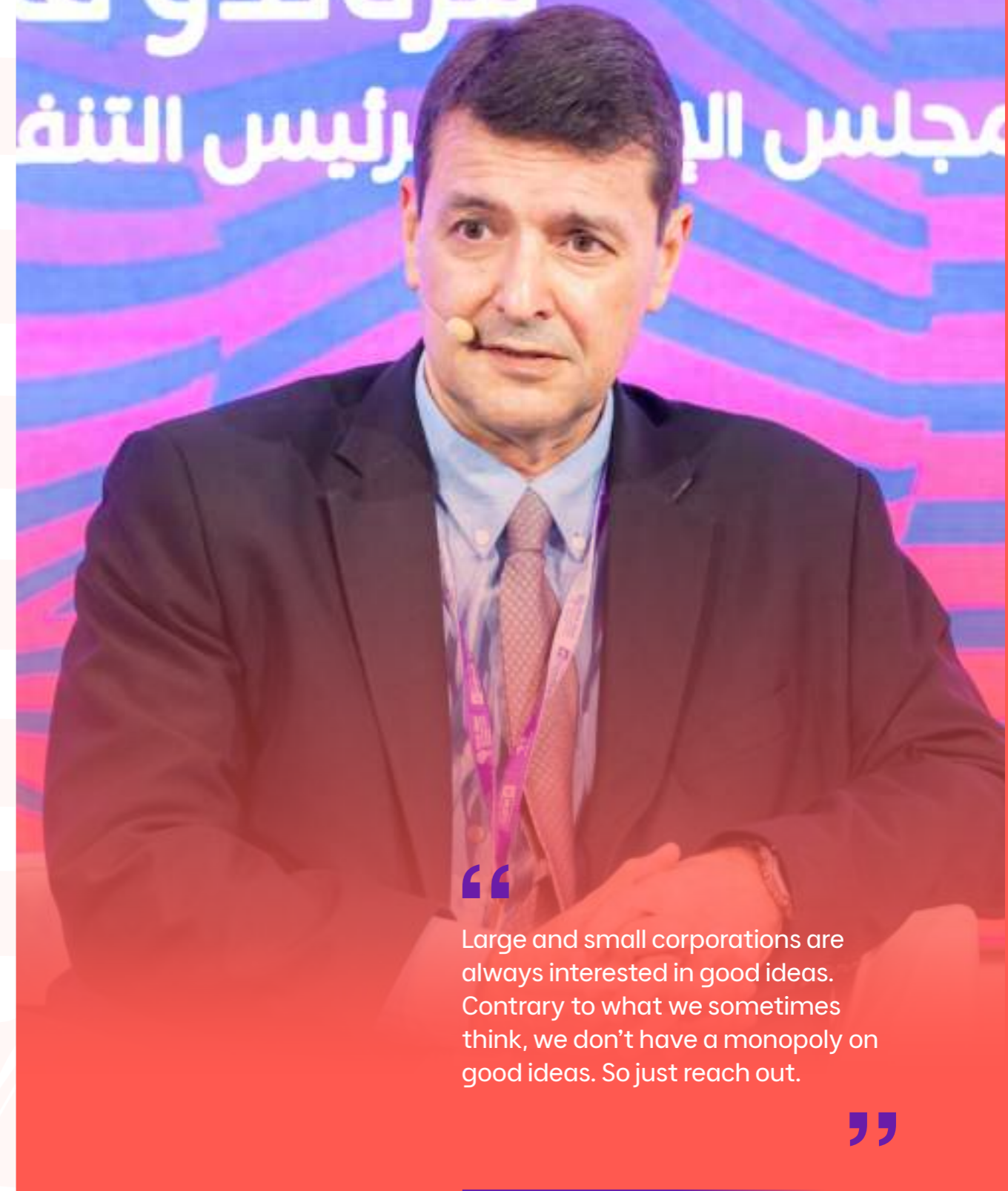

This session explored how great ideas grow into thriving startups. It brought together financial experts for a deep dive on unlocking funding, mastering the art of pitching and navigating today's fast-paced investment world. They broke down real-world strategies for turning inspiration into impact—giving young entrepreneurs practical tips on raising capital, building resilience and launching ventures that can define the future. The session proved to be an eye-opener, sparking ambition and highlighting how finance fuels tomorrow's big ideas.

Takeaways

1. Founders need both the “founder’s mode” mindset for passion, agility, resilience and practical business skills, including frameworks for hiring, dealing with investors, and understanding market dynamics. The number one reason companies fail is addressing a problem the market doesn’t need.
2. When seeking investment, you must have skin in the game. Investors want to see that you’ve invested your own money, developed an MVP, gained traction, and are fully dedicated; the biggest motivator for successful founders is the fear of failure.
3. Building trust with investors and corporate partners comes through small things in the early days: being clear and professional in meetings, delivering documentation faster than promised, showing up early, and demonstrating character and values alignment. Saudi Arabia now provides ample funding and support through programs like Misk and MUNSHAAT, so the challenge is now about time allocation, continuous learning, and taking action.

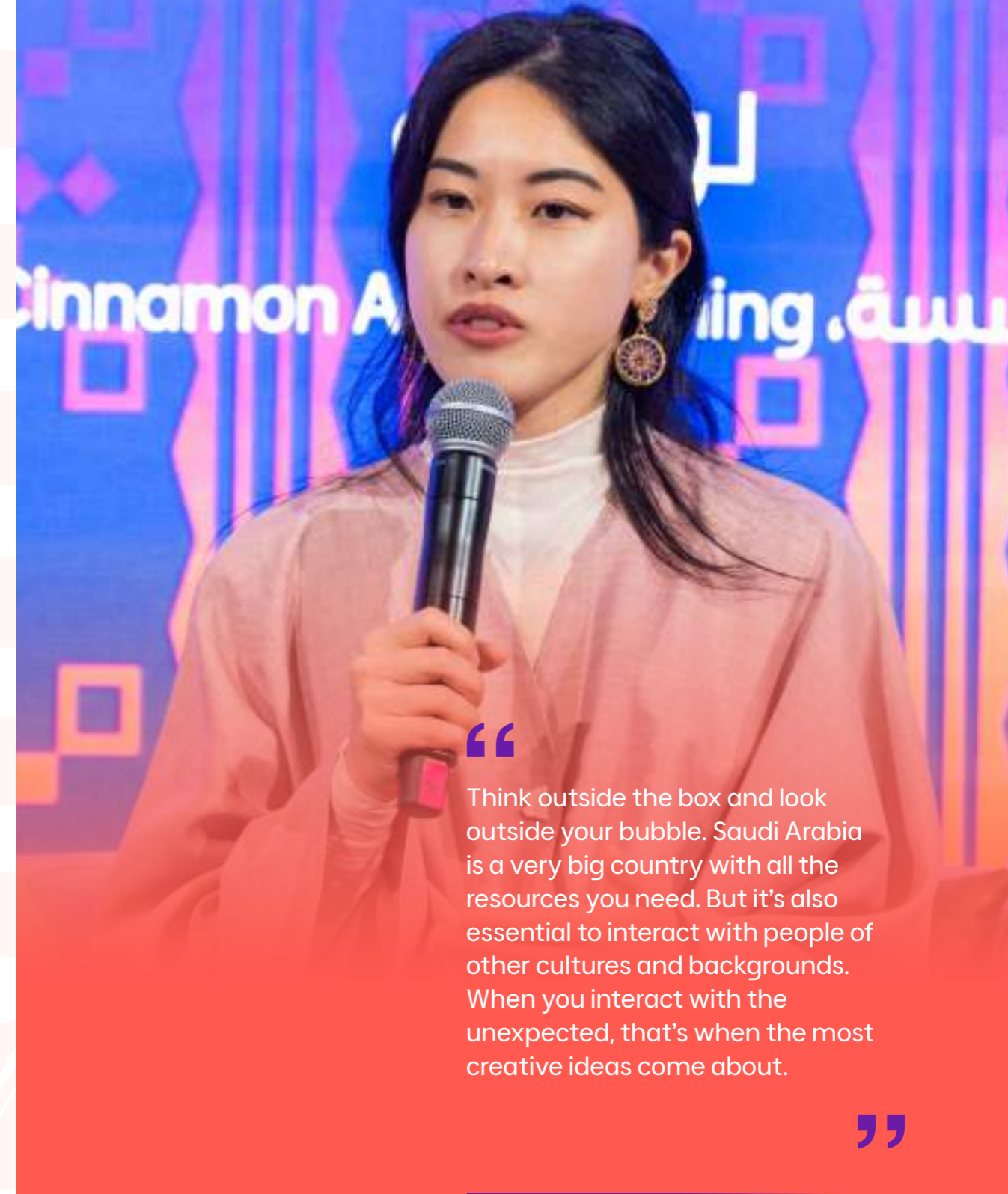

Takeaways

1. Creative currency today means embracing AI as a creative partner rather than a competitor, looking beyond your local bubble to interact with different cultures, and prioritizing uniqueness to distinguish yourself; people are always looking for new projects and things that haven't been done before.
2. Artists should maintain the purity of their creative voice by not thinking commercially; once you start thinking commercially, the soul of your work is gone. This is where intermediaries like curators, studio managers, and galleries become essential to handle the business side while you focus on creation.
3. The biggest challenge isn't funding or resources, especially in the GCC, but rather time allocation and adaptability; survival today isn't about being the smartest or most talented, it's about being adaptable and open to new possibilities because there's an update every single day.

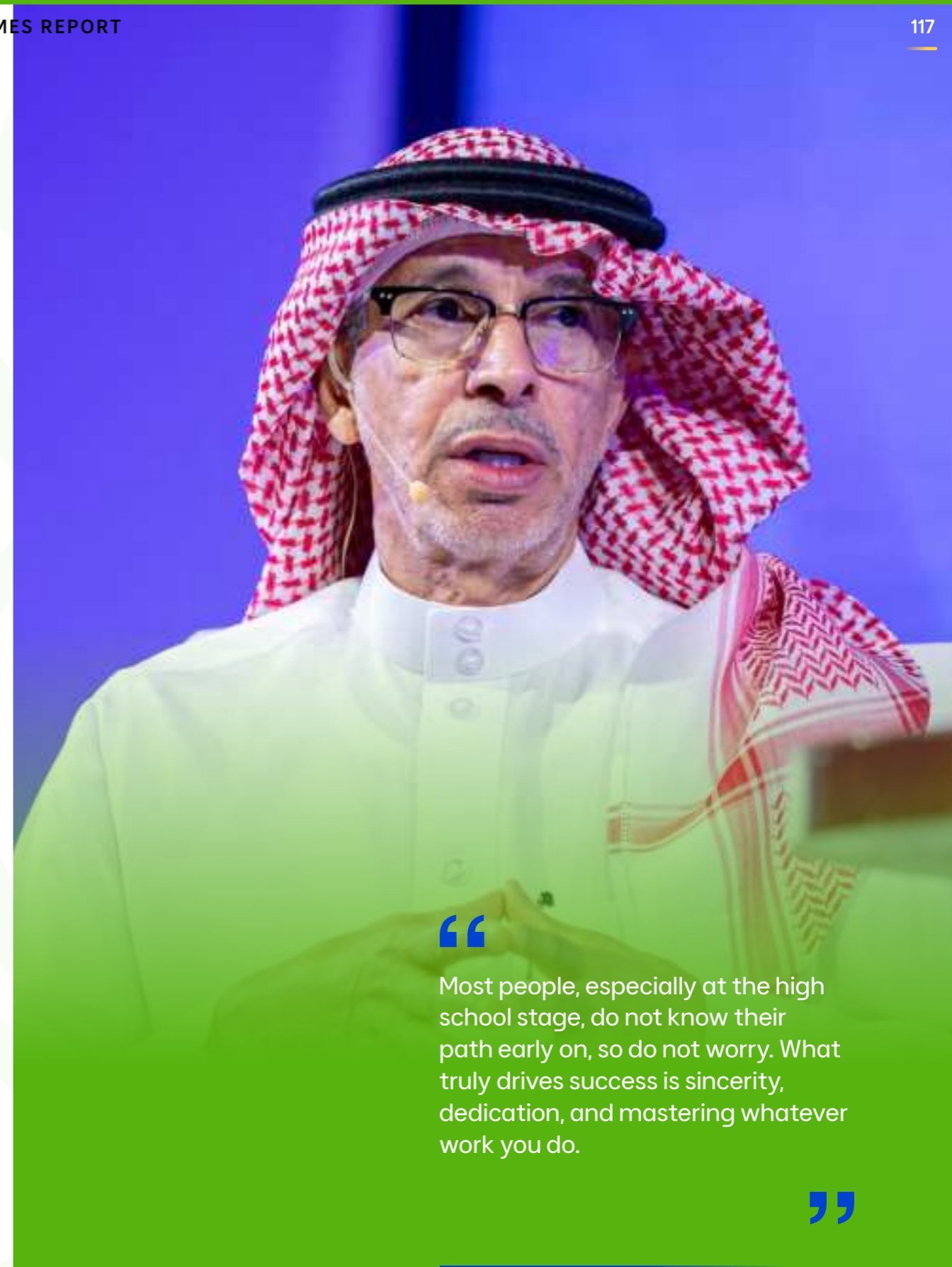

Dr. Abdulaziz Alwasil, the Permanent Representative of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia to the United Nations, shared his journey from academic beginnings to international platforms, reflecting on the milestones that shaped his leadership and diplomatic vision. He emphasized that true diplomacy begins with faith in one's nation, a sense of responsibility in representing it, and the ability to create meaningful impact on the global stage.

Takeaways

1. Representing a nation is a responsibility rooted in values, balance, and trust. Diplomacy is ultimately about carrying a country's vision with discipline, restraint, and clarity in every word and action.
2. Career paths are rarely linear, especially early on. Dedication, sincerity, and mastery of one's work matter more than choosing the "right" specialization from the start, and change is often a step forward.
3. Dialogue, persuasion, and emotional control are the most reliable tools available to everyone in diplomacy. Power belongs to the state, but effectiveness depends on patience, humility, and the ability to listen under pressure.
4. Saudi diplomacy is defined by balance and independence, allowing the Kingdom to engage credibly across regions, ideologies, and crises while playing an active mediating role globally.
5. Youth play a central role in shaping the future of nations. Institutions like Misk exist to equip them with confidence, exposure, and responsibility at a formative stage of their lives.

Takeaways

1. Leadership, instead of being a shift from technical skill to authority, is a shift in mindset from reacting to problems to actively shaping direction, opportunity, and outcomes.
2. Effective leadership is learned more from process than personality. Vision, strategy, execution, and measurement form a repeatable discipline that evolves as organisations and people grow.
3. The greatest barrier to leadership is internal. Self-doubt, passivity, and fear of action often prevent capable individuals from stepping into responsibility more than any external constraint.
4. In moments of crisis, leaders are measured by calmness, values, and judgment. Panic erodes trust, while clarity, balance, and consistency preserve organisations and people.
5. Long-term success depends on values and sustainable growth. Financial results are outcomes of customer focus, integrity, and long-term investment.

Takeaways

1. Ambition does not require certainty. Progress often begins with a decision to move forward despite fear, incomplete plans, or lack of permission, trusting that clarity emerges through action.
2. Career paths are rarely fixed or linear. Shifting specializations, redefining roles, and letting go of titles can unlock broader impact, especially when the focus remains on contribution rather than position.
3. Leadership is rooted in trust, humility, and shared purpose. It grows through relationships, attitude, and the ability to bring people together around meaningful impact.
4. National transformation accelerates with a clear vision, aligned priorities, and relentless execution. Coordinated reform, data-driven decision-making, and institutional courage can move faster than commonly assumed.
5. Youth competitiveness today depends on continuous learning, openness to technology, and the ability to turn data, platforms, and global access into tangible solutions, as opposed to waiting for predefined roles.

Takeaways

1. Leadership begins with a mindset that sees challenges as invitations to act rather than reasons to stop. Asking “why not” reframes obstacles into opportunities and keeps progress moving forward.
2. Technology alone is not a conduit for transformation. Real impact comes from applying technology with purpose, clarity, and a focus on how it improves systems, services, and people’s lives.
3. Institutional transformation requires courage, communication, and trust. Clear vision, honest dialogue, and psychological safety reduce resistance and allow change to scale sustainably.
4. Comfort limits growth. Discomfort, curiosity, and the willingness to step into uncertainty are essential signals that learning and progress are still happening.
5. For youth, curiosity and courage matter as much as skill. Asking better questions, staying optimistic, and learning continuously are what turn opportunity into lasting impact.

Stories are how we make meaning, how memory meets imagination, and how we connect to one another across time, place, and experience. Hosted by Asaan, this session invited participants to explore storytelling as a living force that nurtures curiosity, creativity, and empathy across disciplines. From culture and art to science and technology, the conversation illuminated how stories help us see the world and each other more deeply. Together, panelists reflected on the ways storytelling builds understanding, inspires discovery, and guides us toward a more connected future.

Takeaways

1. Storytelling endures when it centers human emotion and shared experience, allowing audiences to arrive at meaning themselves. By connecting identity, memory, and values across generations, stories become living bridges between past, present, and future, rather than fixed cultural artifacts.
2. Curation is itself a form of storytelling, where context, sequencing, and place invite reflection instead of instruction. When stories are revealed gradually and emotionally, they create deeper understanding, personal belief, and cross-cultural connection without prescribing a single interpretation.
3. Technology expands reach, but does not replace meaning; the human element remains the anchor. Digital tools are most powerful when they serve the story rather than dominate it, preserving emotional intimacy while enabling cultural exchange across borders and generations.
4. Lasting cultural impact depends on listening to youth and documenting everyday life. By giving younger generations ownership of stories and intentionally archiving lived experiences, institutions transform from static repositories into evolving, participatory narratives that future audiences can reinterpret and build upon.

Youth Lead Now



What happens when youth lead not just for change, but with each other? This hands-on session invited attendees to co-create ideas for collective leadership through play, dialogue and storytelling. Through hands-on activities and storytelling, it focused on the three pillars of youth leadership: inspiration, action and advocacy. Participants tested tools, practiced with peers, and turned ideas into an actionable plan. Every voice counted, every idea mattered, and every story sparked a connected, youth-led community.

Takeaways

1. Symbolic gestures, such as inviting youth to speak or appear on panels, do not constitute meaningful inclusion. Young people seek roles where they can shape decisions, drive initiatives, and advocate for change rather than simply providing commentary.
2. Many youth programs successfully build confidence and provide valuable skills, but not all lead to meaningful leadership. The quality and depth of empowerment varies; some initiatives offer genuine influence, while others stop at participation, short of real impact.
3. Action, advocacy, and inspiration form a holistic model for youth leadership. Effective youth leadership comes from young people identifying issues and taking action, advocating for change with evidence and clarity, and inspiring others through visible engagement. This model creates practical leadership.
4. You are tomorrow's leaders, and also today's. With the right platforms and opportunities, young people can meaningfully influence systems, shape policies, and inspire the next generation now.



Turning Ideas Into Creation



The Creation Lab provided a fast, practical space where young creators turned strong ideas into working prototypes. Guided by makers and mentors, teams followed clear steps: understanding a need, framing a challenge, sketching options, building a quick model, and testing with peers. Between sprints, participants refined their story and mapped a simple business model. Attendees left with a tangible prototype, a sharper narrative, and the confidence to keep building beyond MGF25, with a prototype support voucher helping selected teams continue development.

Takeaways

1. Design thinking starts with empathy; mapping everyday journeys, identifying friction points, and recognizing needs hidden within routine behavior. Without accurately defining the user problem, any solution risks fixing the wrong issue.
2. Analyzing customers, competitors, and industry trends ensures that ideas align with real demand. Qualitative interviews and targeted surveys provide deeper insights than broad, unfocused questionnaires.
3. Structured ideation tools (including SCAMPER, KTDA analysis, and weighted prioritization) help turn research insights into concrete concepts and allow teams to compare solution options based on real user needs and market relevance.
4. Early prototypes test form and concept, while later versions validate usability, performance, and feasibility. Tools such as 3D printing, laser cutting, circuits, and digital interfaces (e.g., Figma) accelerate the development cycle.
5. Dedicated innovation centers, prototyping labs, virtual platforms, and competitions help startups accelerate development, access technical expertise, and improve scalability, thus contributing to measurable economic impact.

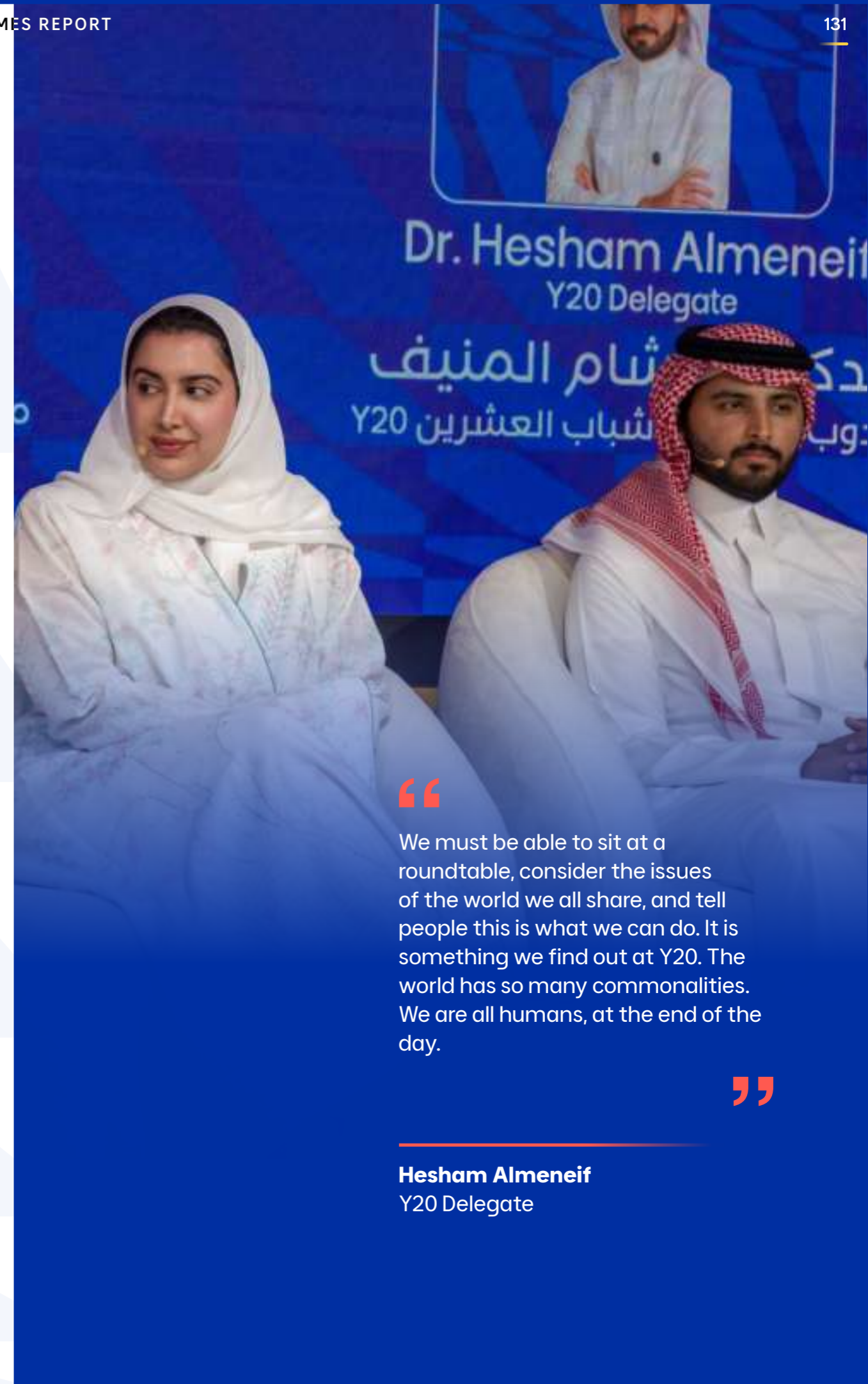

Youth representation is often celebrated but rarely unpacked. What does it truly mean to carry a mandate, balance listening with advocacy, and move from token seats to real influence? In this panel, youth envoys and global delegates shared candid insights from the frontlines of representation: what worked, what didn't, and what they wish they had known earlier.

Takeaways

1. Global youth representation is reserved for those consistently preparing, building knowledge, and staying curious. Impact comes from readiness, doing the work long before opportunities appear, so, when moments arise, participation is informed, credible, and trusted.
2. Effective representation extends beyond public speaking into negotiation, relationship-building, and informal influence. Delegates who understand context, research deeply, and engage in balanced dialogue bridge differences more effectively and contribute meaningfully to outcomes at global tables.
3. Exposure to diverse cultures, disciplines, and geographies sharpens perspective and purpose. Language skills, travel, and firsthand engagement dismantle misconceptions, humanize global issues, and strengthen the ability to translate local realities into shared global priorities rooted in empathy.
4. Lasting impact depends on alignment between personal mission, national vision, and collective values. Delegations that combine strong preparation, interpersonal intelligence, and cultural confidence export lived models, build soft power through authenticity, and leave long-lasting impressions.

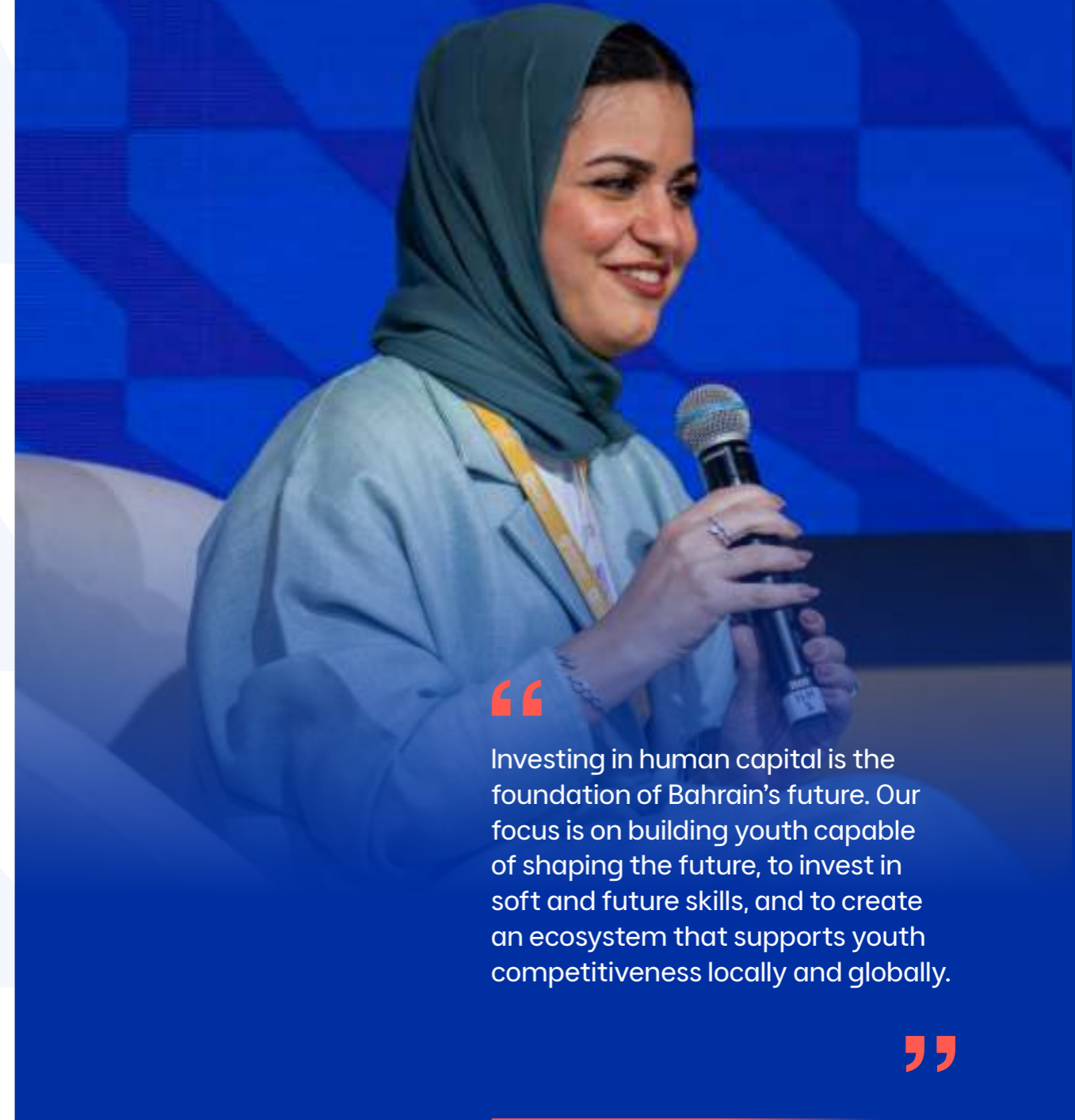

Rawan Najeeb Tawfeeqi, Minister of Youth Affairs in Bahrain, explored how to build systems that nurture talent, strengthen values and prepare the next generation for leadership. Through personal reflections and practical insights, she shared what she's learned about empowering others, creating spaces for innovation and ensuring that youth voices are heard in decisions that shape their future.

Takeaways

1. Youth potential turns into power when individuals step into uncertainty with courage, knowing that belief, especially early nomination and trust, creates responsibility. Rigorous, selective programs accelerate growth by pushing participants beyond comfort, embedding a duty to reinvest skills, confidence, and learning back into society.
2. Sustainable youth empowerment requires long-term national vision. Investing consistently in human capital, future and soft skills, and hands-on exposure across sectors creates an ecosystem where youth move beyond participation into competitiveness, equipped to shape economies, industries, and public life.
3. Clarity emerges through exposure. When youth engage with diverse fields in practical environments, confusion gives way to informed choice, allowing talents to surface in unexpected ways. Structured exploration helps young people discover strengths, pivot across disciplines, and align ambition with real-world opportunity.
4. Youth thrive in systems where they feel safe, trusted, heard, supported, and valued. Embedding young voices into decision-making bodies, councils, and advisory platforms transforms empowerment into leadership, ensuring policies reflect lived realities and enabling aspirations to translate into influence, responsibility, and lasting impact.

Pitch And Persuade

Big ideas grab attention, but making them stick requires precision and persuasion. Pitch master Daniel Cronin and negotiation pro Steve A. Tineo led a rapid masterclass in the art of delivering an irresistible pitch, and how to navigate the tough conversations that follow in this stand-and-deliver showcase, sharpening attendees' storytelling, imparting strategic negotiation moves, and spotlighting both the art of quick impact and the skill of turning initial interest into lasting results.

Takeaways

1. Ideas only gain power when they're translated into belief. Effective pitching isn't about explaining everything; it's about earning attention, trust, and one meaningful question that opens the door to deeper conversation and mobilizes others to act on a shared vision.
2. Strong pitches respect time and cognitive load. Simplicity, a clear one-liner, and showing impact matter more than technical depth. Audiences don't need full detail upfront; they need to quickly grasp the problem, feel urgency, and see credible next steps worth exploring.
3. Execution credibility outweighs polish. Demonstrating traction, external validation, and a clear timeline signals reliability far more than complex slides. A pitch ultimately sells the ability to deliver, not just the idea itself, and should always end with a precise, intentional request.
4. Sustainable success hinges on emotional intelligence and attitude on top of sheer skill. Conflict, ego, and fear derail teams and negotiations, while self-awareness, listening, humility, and care build trust. People remember how you made them feel, which determines whether doors stay open.

Play is serious. Science without imagination and curiosity means our greatest innovations may never have happened. Bringing play into science facilitates a fearless, supportive environment that encourages discovery through trial-and-error. Participating in play-based activities at every age has cognitive, emotional, and neurological benefits. In this session, speakers reimagined the scientist's toolkit, bringing design, technology, storytelling, and science together to spark questions, creative thinking, and reveal practical insights, turning playful ideas into real-world innovations.

Takeaways

1. Play functions as a serious engine for learning and innovation, activating curiosity, imagination, and scientific thinking across ages. When framed through narrative and hands-on exploration, playful experiences deepen understanding, spark creativity, and transform abstract concepts into memorable, emotionally resonant learning moments.
2. Impactful science engagement is built through co-creation. Designing with audiences (families, schools, and communities) turns visitors into collaborators, strengthens relevance, and creates ecosystems where learning extends beyond institutions into homes, classrooms, and everyday life.
3. Play scales when institutions blend physical spaces, digital platforms, and adaptable atmospheres. Changing how an experience feels, rather than simplifying content, allows children and adults to engage at different depths, while online extensions ensure access, continuity, and long-term learning beyond the visit.
4. Play creates lasting impact by allowing people to “become” scientists, engineers, or creators. Role-based, open-ended experiences invite experimentation, failure, and problem-solving, building confidence and identity early. Curiosity compounds into skills, aspirations, and future pathways.

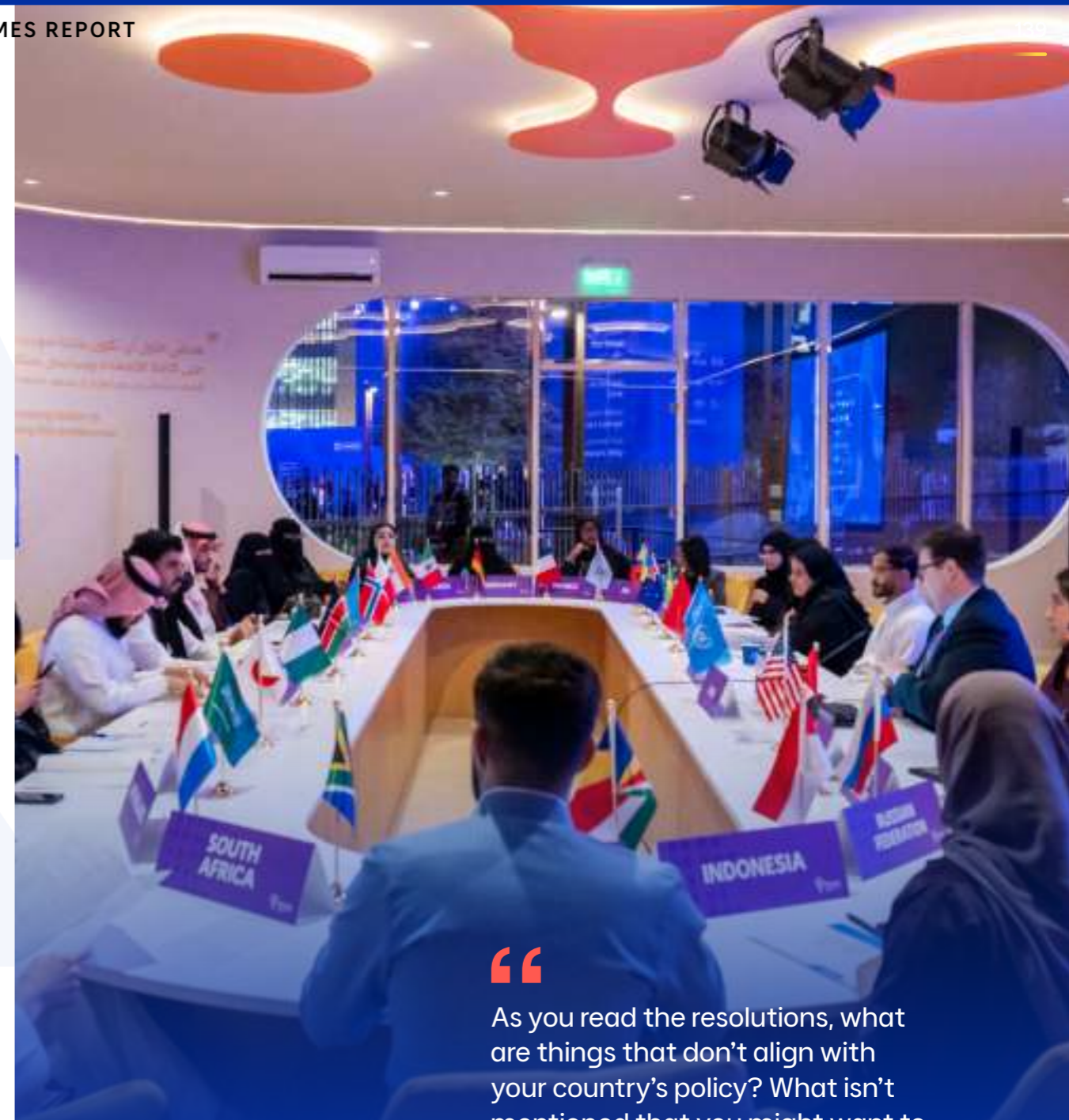

This simulation was an opportunity to step into the role of a UN delegate, represent one's country, and take the reins of urgent talks that could change the planet's future. Attendees needed to debate, collaborate, and delineate real-world policies with other young changemakers, all while crafting the MGF Declaration: a bold youth agenda for our environmental future. Delivered in partnership with WFUNA, this hands-on experience opened the door to global diplomacy, showing how passion and teamwork (plus a bit of diplomatic hustle!) could shape real decisions toward a sustainable tomorrow.

Takeaways

1. Diplomacy works by temporarily setting aside personal identity to represent national interests, forcing participants to understand trade-offs, constraints, and incentives beyond their own views. This role-shift builds empathy, strategic thinking, and an appreciation for why global agreements are slow but necessary.
2. Consensus is built through language. Small changes in wording can yield agreement, revealing how global outcomes are often shaped by precision, compromise, and persistence rather than sweeping ideological wins.
3. Global environmental problems expose unequal impacts and capacities. While some countries contribute little to pollution, they suffer disproportionately, underscoring the need for fair financing, capacity building, and differentiated responsibility embedded directly into international commitments.
4. Effective multilateral action requires lifecycle thinking. Addressing microplastics demands coordinated solutions across production, use, waste management, technology transfer, monitoring, and community engagement, proving that environmental challenges cannot be solved by single policies or isolated national efforts.

The Art Of Smart Mistakes

Success isn't measured by perfection, but by the wisdom earned from facing mistakes rather than fearing them. In this practical and motivational session, entrepreneur and leadership coach Salah Abo El Magd explained how every youthful misstep is an opportunity for awareness and improvement. Young innovators learned powerful lessons on self-reflection, accountability and resilience, encouragement to embrace setbacks as stepping stones, and guidance to adopting a growth mindset, leaving with tools to transform failure into a foundation for long-term success.

Takeaways

1. Mistakes are made on the pathway to success, revealing blind spots, refining judgment, and keeping ego in check. Right and wrong function as a sequence; without experimentation and error, progress stalls and potential remains unrealized.
2. The fear of mistakes, fueled by perfectionism, turns capable people into spectators of their own ideas. Waiting for certainty or the "perfect moment" delays action, while those who move despite fear accept that meaningful success carries the cost of repeated, visible failure.
3. Failure is a powerful filter of relationships and values. True allies are revealed in moments of error, offering clarity about who supports growth, learning, and integrity beyond public success or shared victories.
4. Personal and collective sustainable growth requires a mindset shift from blame to learning. Leaders and institutions must create safe spaces for experimentation, encourage humility and curiosity, and normalize failing fast, knowing resilience and progress emerge through repeated attempts.

1. Trust in media is built before the camera turns on: through self-honesty, emotional safety, and conversations that prioritize understanding over performance. Audiences sense credibility when content isn't engineered for virality, but shaped by integrity, care, and respect for the truth.
2. Depth still matters in an age of short-form media. Bite-sized videos work best as entry points, guiding audiences toward long-form, thoughtful content. When ideas are well-crafted and relevant, viewers are willing to invest time, attention, and sustained engagement.
3. Influential media reflects its audience rather than speaking over them. Programs earn loyalty when they resonate with real social concerns, offer clarity instead of noise, and present coherent narratives that connect local realities to broader cultural and global contexts with intention and alignment.
4. The biggest risks for emerging media professionals are chasing fast fame, trends, and financial reward at the expense of credibility. Influence comes from discipline, curiosity, and minimizing personal bias, loving the craft enough to prioritize impact, responsibility, and long-term trust over visibility.

Takeaways

1. Authenticity compounds performance. Staying true to who you are conserves energy, builds trust, and amplifies results. Pretending to be someone else adds friction.
2. Resilience and risk-taking are decisive differentiators. Many people have ideas, but few pursue them with sustained effort.
3. In a distraction-heavy environment, deliberate focus creates outsized progress. Replace scattered pursuits with tight execution cycles and clear, measurable commitments.
4. Limitations can function as forcing mechanisms that sharpen focus, accelerate learning, and stimulate creativity, converting adverse conditions into durable advantages.

Born without legs and only one arm due to Hanhart Syndrome and given less than a 30% chance of survival, Nick Santonastasso has spent his life proving what's possible when excuses are replaced by action. The entrepreneur, author, and coach shared how he turned adversity into advantage, from redefining disability to mastering mindset. Blending personal stories with powerful strategy, Nick empowered young people to build resilience into their projects, dominate their goals and turn the toughest circumstances into the boldest of opportunities.

Takeaways

1. Failure is a training partner, not a verdict. When you welcome failure fast, you collect feedback faster, and momentum becomes your new baseline. Treat missteps like reps and the gym becomes your mind.
2. Focus is a filter that builds your world. Curate your attention, your feed, and your circle, and watch your state, your behavior, and your outcomes start to harmonize.
3. The same event can shrink you or shape you depending on the story you attach. Choose a frame that turns friction into data and detours into direction. That is how losses convert to wins.
4. Authenticity is performance fuel. In a copy-paste world and an age of AI, being unmistakably you is a competitive edge that compounds.

Sharing how his dyslexia empowered him to perceive the world in unique ways, Chris argued that questioning assumptions is often the key to true creativity, with his ‘Start from Zero’ approach and disruptive ideas handing the next generation a proven platform to build towards the next big breakthrough.

Takeaways

1. Persist creatively through obstacles. Treat “impossible” as a specification instead of a certainty. When platforms, data, or tools don’t exist, build them methodically. Recruit exceptional talent, protect deep work, and keep iterating until the hard part becomes invisible and repeatable at scale.
2. Design for the worst case. Engineer for noise, scale, distortion, and unreliable networks so average conditions feel effortless.
3. Reduce problems to undeniable facts and recombine them into new possibilities. First-principles thinking converts assumptions into raw materials and reveals solutions that seem obvious only afterward.

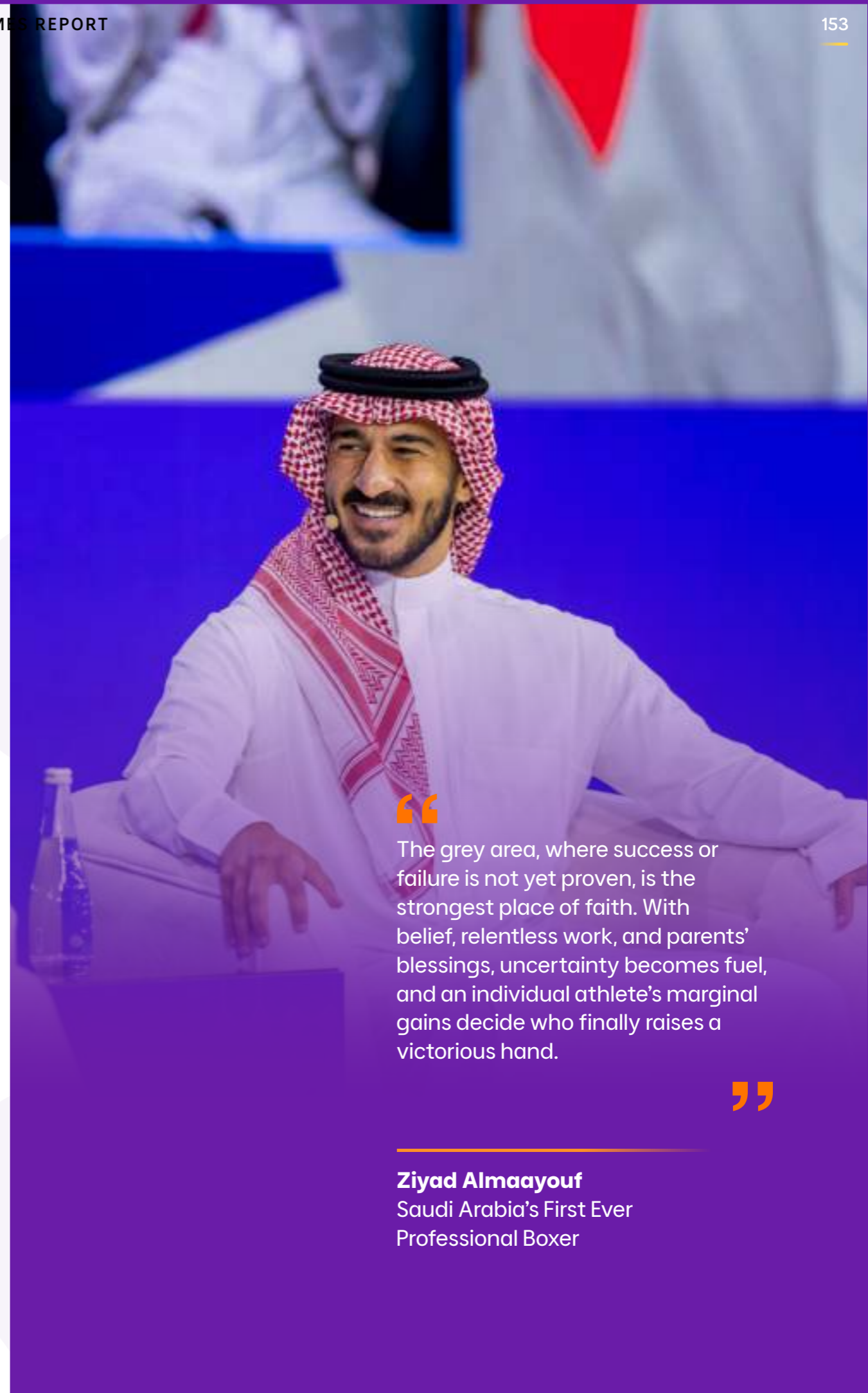

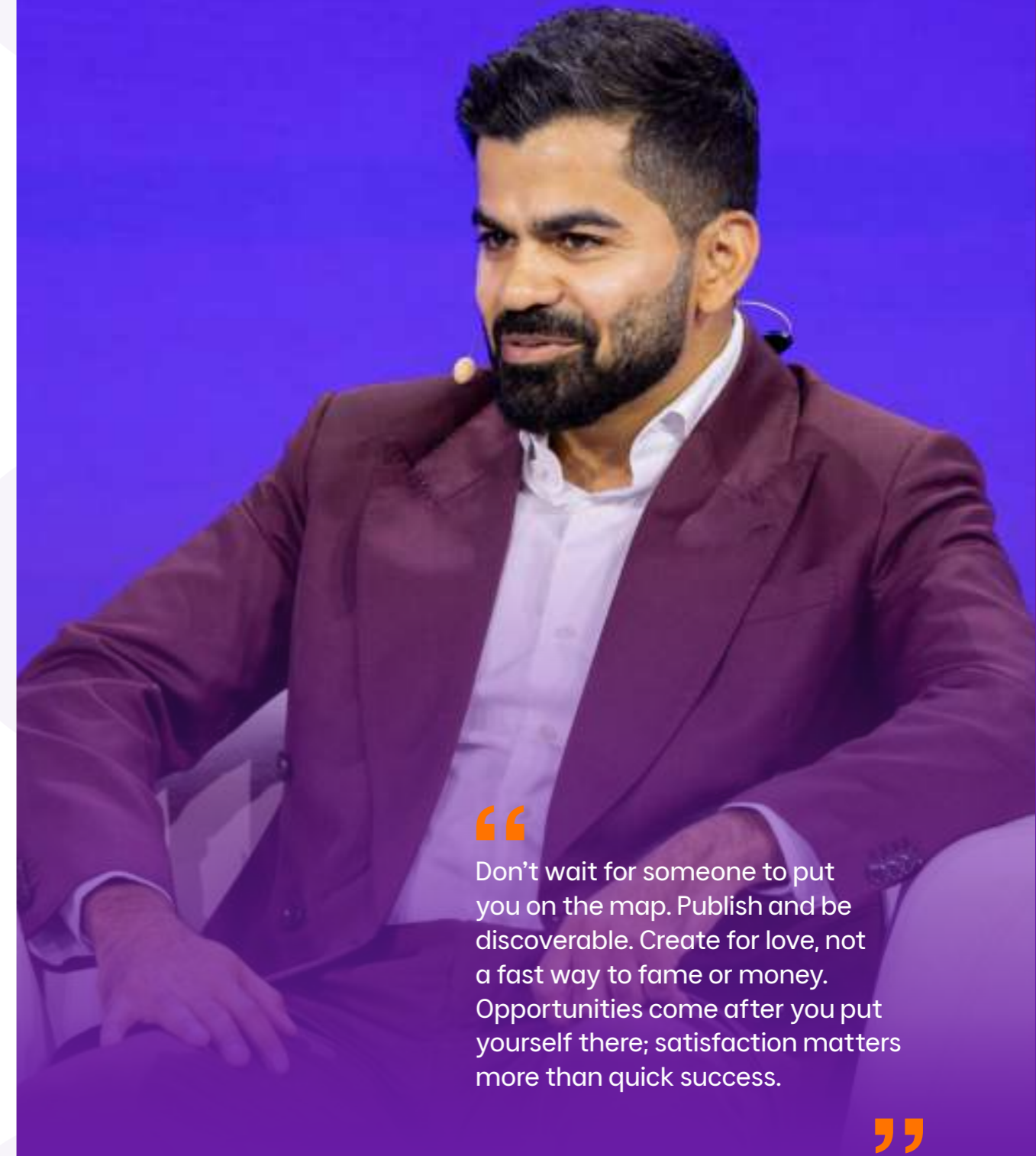

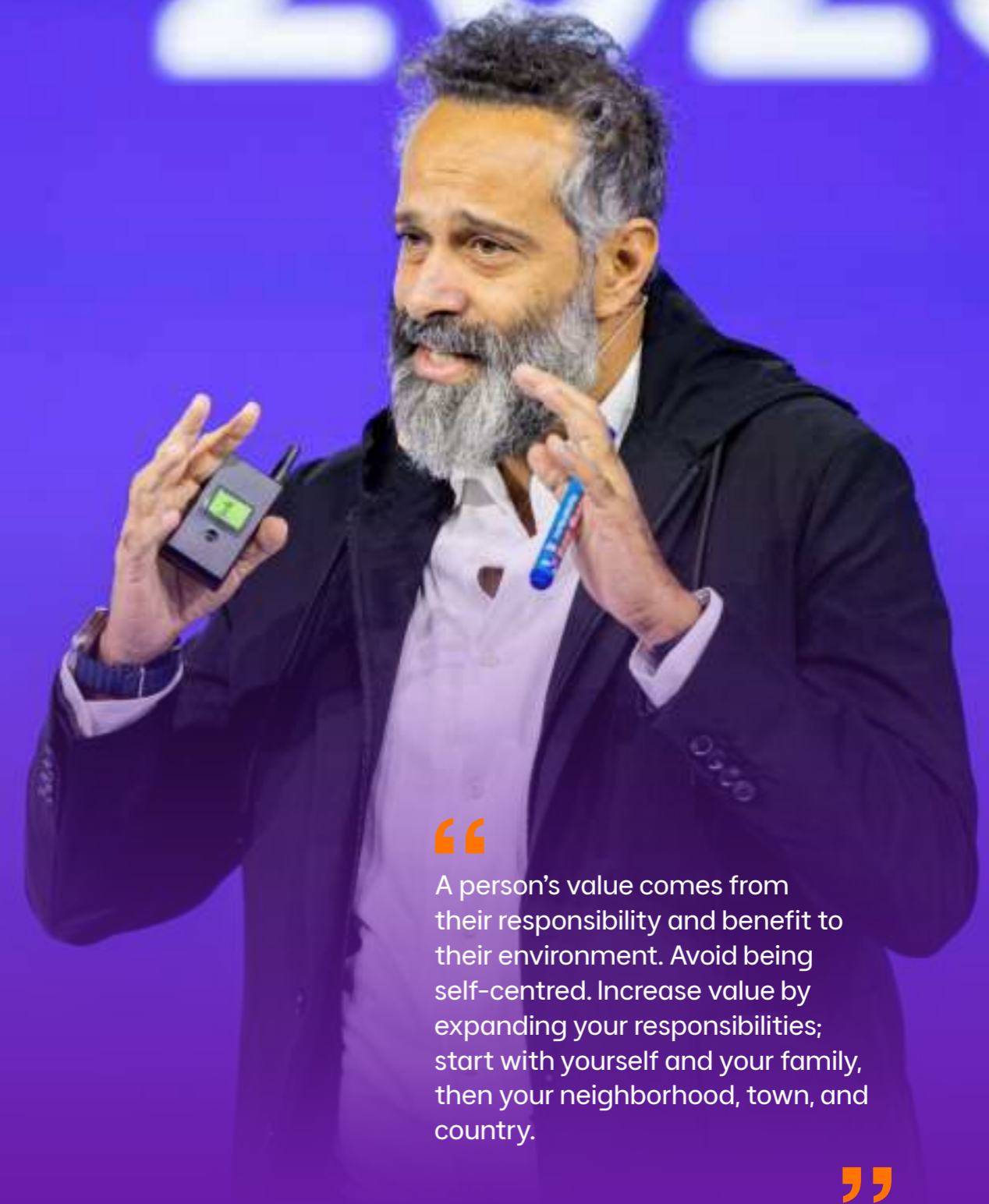

Takeaways

1. Effective climate action requires a deep understanding of science, policy, and national priorities. Youth impact grows when activism is grounded in evidence and translated into locally relevant action.
2. Beyond energy systems, the transition spans education, career aspirations, social behavior, and economic models. Young people are driving this shift by redefining what a meaningful contribution looks like across sectors.
3. Climate narratives often overlook regional realities. Addressing climate change effectively requires solutions rooted in local data, culture, and lived experience, particularly in regions directly tied to global energy security.
4. Not all impact happens at negotiation tables. Grassroots initiatives, nonprofits, and youth-led innovation play a parallel and essential role in awareness, behavior change, and implementation.
5. Individual behavior change, community projects, and early-stage innovation can scale rapidly when adopted collectively. Youth-led initiatives often succeed because they start small but are designed to grow.

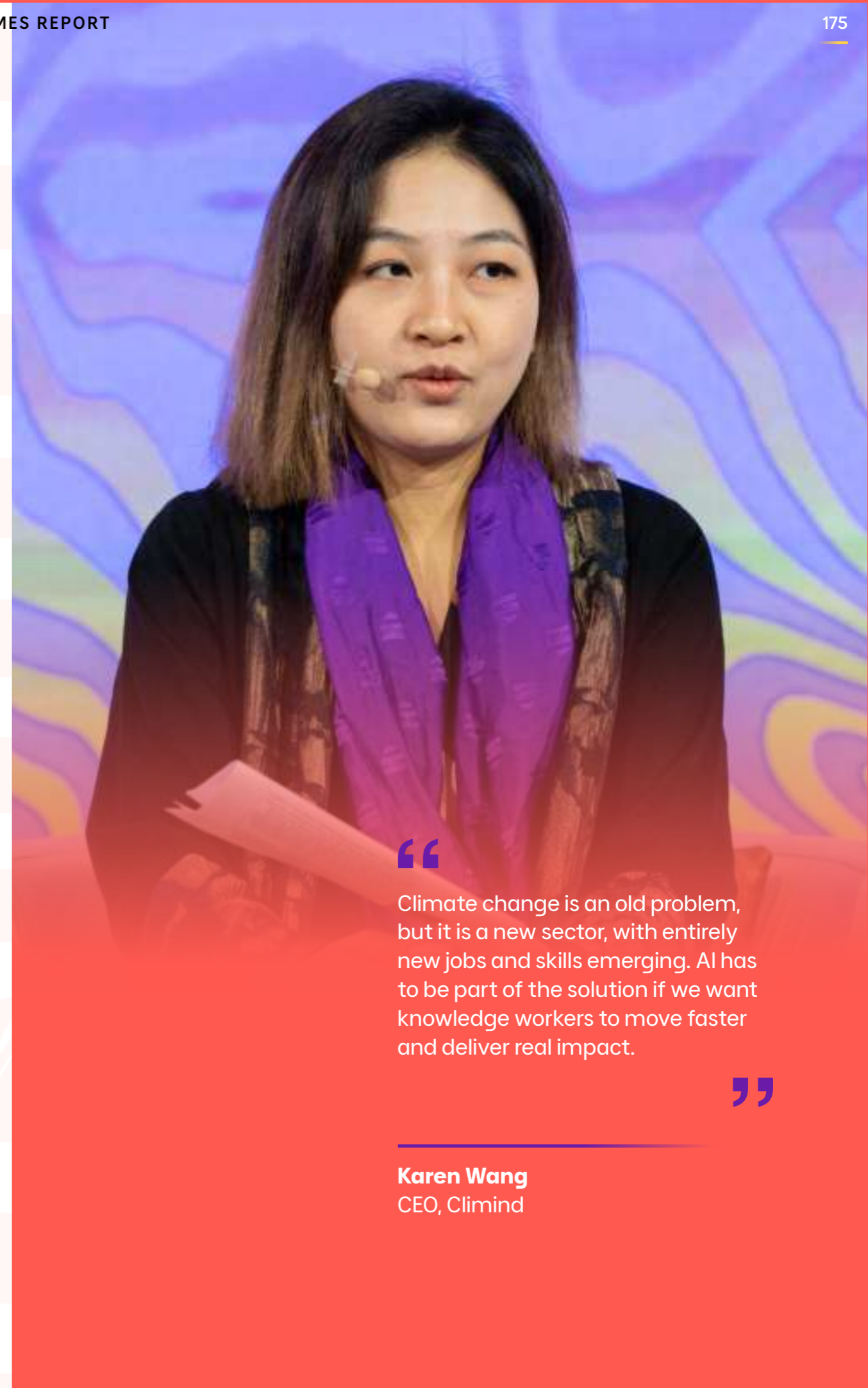

3. Scientific solutions alone are insufficient. Impact depends on frameworks that allow governments, financiers, and civil society to participate through regulation, reporting, and shared incentives.
4. In sustainability-focused AI, accuracy, transparency, and citation matter more than novelty. Solutions succeed when users trust outputs enough to act on them.
5. The current moment combines awareness of past mistakes with access to transformative technologies. Young people are uniquely positioned to convert this into meaningful action.

Kickstarter CEO Everette Taylor followed his keynote with a deeper dive into exactly how today's most successful creative projects are powered by communities, not just capital. Drawing on his experience supporting thousands of creators, he shared how young innovators can cultivate authentic followings, digging into the details of how to turn supporters into collaborators, the pitfalls and possibilities of crowdfunding, and how the next generation can best harness the collective power of youth.

Takeaways

1. Durable communities don't start with virality; they start with a founder's stamina and clarity. Passion without perseverance expires fast. The projects that become movements are led with long-horizon commitment, disciplined focus, and a business mindset that treats community as strategy.
2. Letting your audience into the process turns creation into collaboration. The advantage isn't "engagement," but intelligence: feedback reveals what people actually want, sharpens product-market fit, and builds loyalty, while creators protect vision by balancing listening with imagination.
3. Community is capital: most momentum comes from people already in your orbit, with new supporters arriving through trust and word-of-mouth. Building an audience before launching reduces risk, validates demand, and creates champions who market for you more powerfully than ads or hype.
4. In a world where failure is public, resilience becomes a creator skill. Progress depends on failing loudly, learning quickly, and staying authentic under scrutiny. Long-term scale also requires self-care, because burnout quietly dismantles even winning communities.

Sporting excellence demands a fearless mindset, whether it's out on the pitch, in freefall or leading the evolution of the institution itself. To be successful, young people need to ally talent and opportunity with the rituals and strategic resilience to stay focused when pressure peaks. Attendees heard from leading sports persons and patrons on what it really takes to operate at the edge of human potential, uncover the habits and mindset shifts that can push the next generation beyond fear and failure, and learn how psychological training can make you not just a fearless competitor but a leader in your daily life.

Takeaways

1. High-performance sports cultivate the same foundations required for leadership: mental readiness, strategic thinking, emotional control, and the ability to perform under pressure. Physical training becomes a vehicle for psychological strength.
2. Fear sharpens focus and decision-making when acknowledged and managed properly. Progress comes from understanding fear, controlling it, and acting despite it.
3. Both athletic and leadership journeys are non-linear. Recovery, reflection, and resilience matter more than avoiding loss, and long-term growth depends on how quickly and intelligently one rebounds.
4. Personal achievements become truly impactful when translated into structures, pathways, and institutions that create opportunities for others, particularly future generations.
5. Sports now open pathways into leadership, governance, technology, business, and policy. Young people are no longer limited to participation on the field; they can shape entire ecosystems around it.

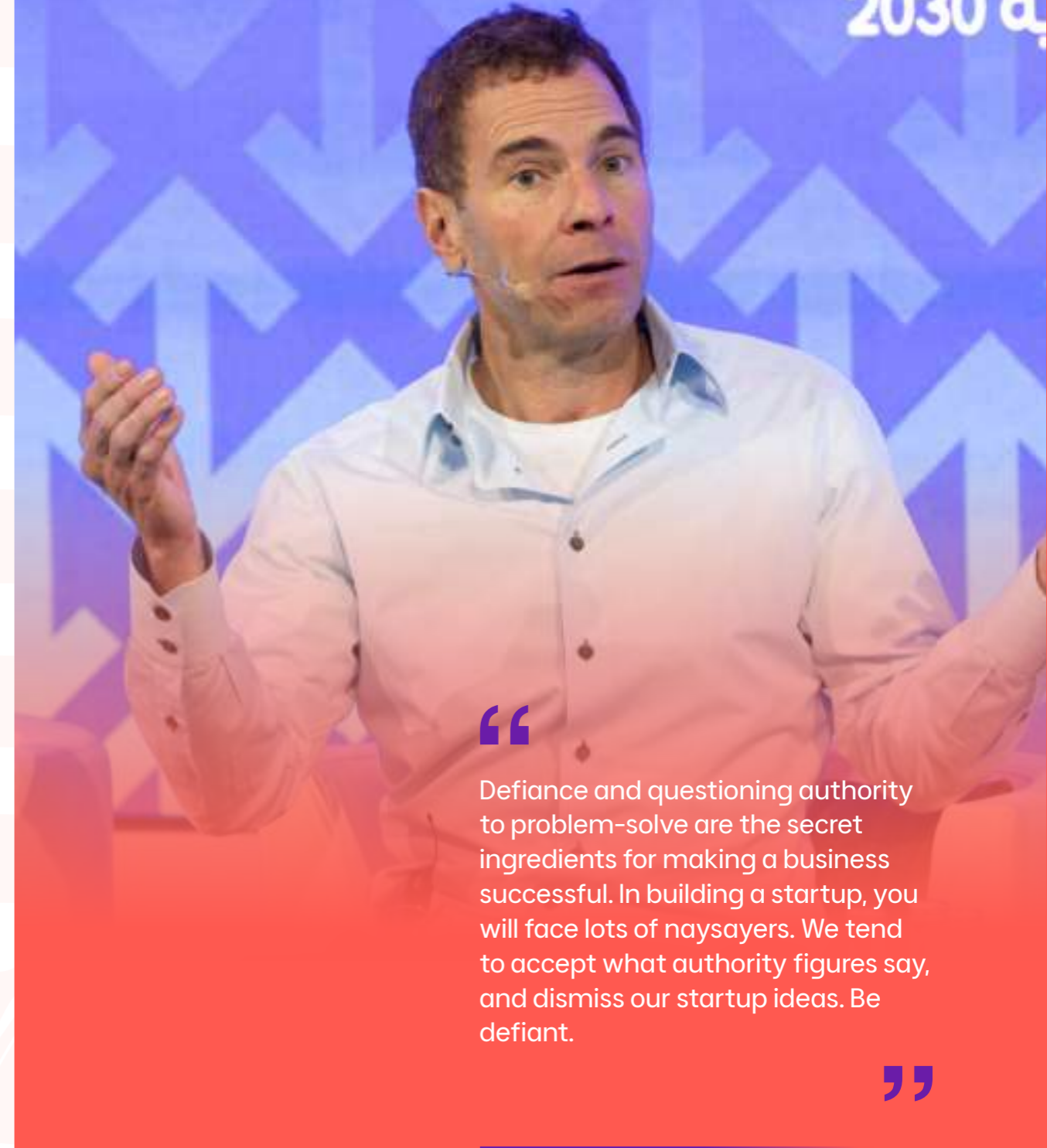

Breakthrough ideas often start with trying to fix everyday frustrations that the average person simply ignores. Entrepreneur and founder Chris Barton drew on his experiences at Shazam, Google, and Dropbox to give youth innovators a blueprint on how best to challenge assumptions, identify problems worth solving and then rigorously test bold solutions. Participants left with practical insight into how to turn simple observations into world-changing ventures.

Takeaways

1. Great businesses begin by obsessively noticing friction, small, repeated moments where life feels harder than it should be, and testing whether solving them creates meaningful value at scale. Frequency multiplied by impact, not flashiness, determines whether a problem is worth building around.
2. Entrepreneurship rewards constructive defiance: questioning expert consensus, challenging “that won’t work” assumptions, and persisting when authority discourages you. Progress often depends on seeing non-consensus insights early and holding conviction long enough for the world, technology, or timing to catch up.
3. Constraints and personal struggles can become entrepreneurial advantages when they force creative problem-solving. Learning to compensate, adapt, and persist builds resilience, unconventional thinking, and systems-level creativity: traits that matter more than polished execution when navigating uncertainty and inventing what doesn’t yet exist.
4. Momentum comes from disciplined derisking. Founders advance by systematically identifying risks, testing assumptions cheaply, listening closely to negative feedback, and validating demand early, while staying emotionally committed to the problem, flexible on solutions, and patient through long periods of invisibility.

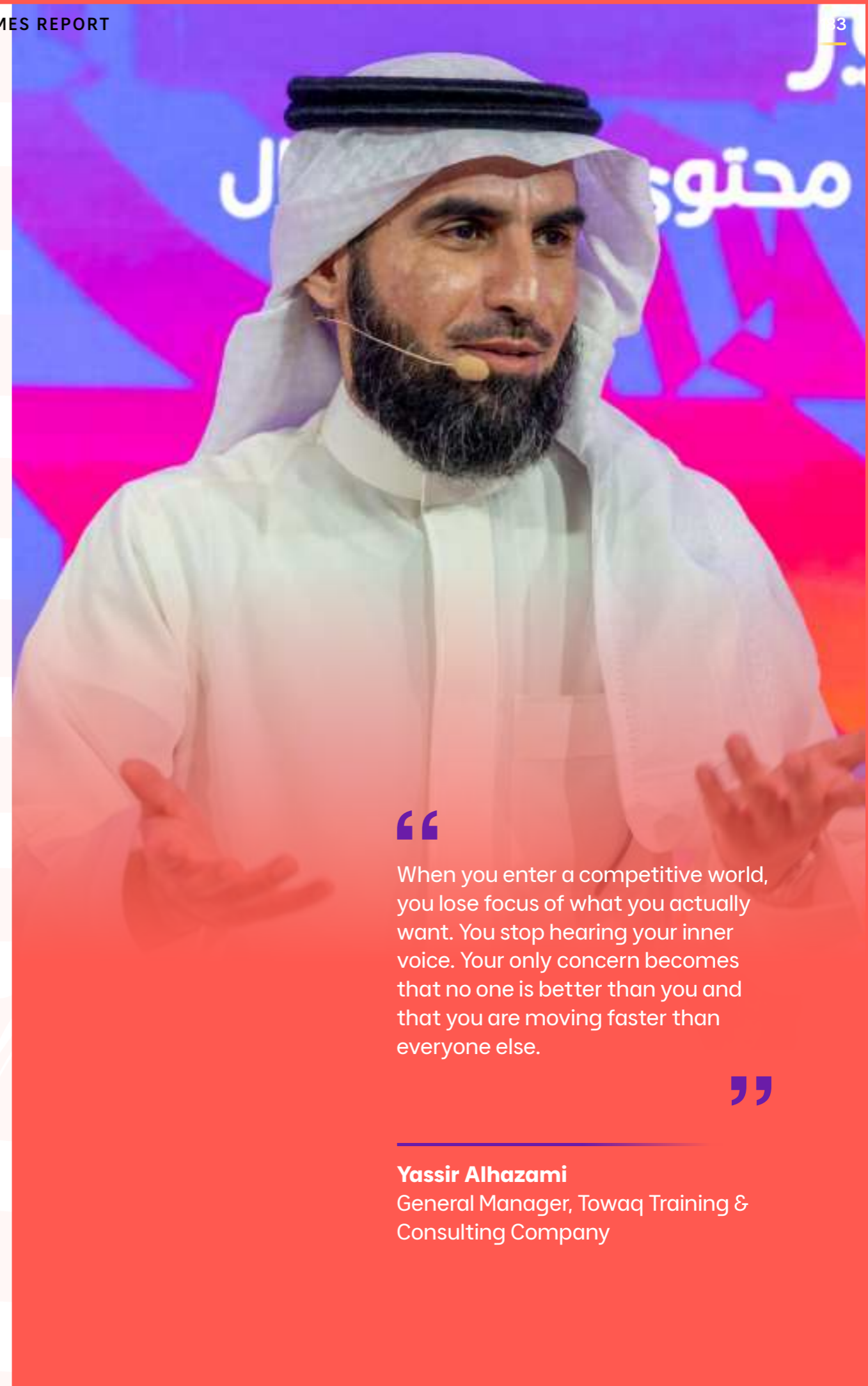

Takeaways

1. When success is defined by speed and comparison, individuals lose balance, clarity, and internal satisfaction.
2. High pressure often comes from the “obligatory self”, living according to what society or family expects rather than personal capacity and desire.
3. “Failed success” describes achievement that looks impressive externally but comes at the cost of mental health, fulfillment, or personal values.
4. People move forward when the pain of staying the same becomes greater than the pain of effort and change.
5. Strong relationships are built gradually. Rushing emotional investment leads to imbalance, while observing first allows for healthier, deeper connections.

2. True horsemanship extends beyond physical skill into ethics, self-discipline, courage, and discernment. Real strength lies in knowing when to advance, retreat, or stand firm, positioning inner mastery and moral clarity as more powerful and enduring than force alone.
3. Cultural heritage becomes innovative when treated as raw material instead of a museum artifact. Creators can build contemporary projects that are distinctive, confident, and globally relevant without losing their original identity by reinterpreting historical practices, aesthetics, and values.
4. Progress accelerates when technology amplifies cultural identity rather than erasing it. Holding onto one's roots while embracing quality, craft, and modern tools produces future-facing narratives that are authentic, resilient, and psychologically empowering.

Some startups evolve, others explode. Participants joined dynamic business leaders from across the media, events, and food industries who are rewriting the playbook for how brands, experiences and audiences connect and scale rapidly. They learned what it takes to build teams, culture and clients at the speed of opportunity, what insights young people need to supercharge their journey, and why timing, trust and tenacity matter more for the next generation than funding.

Takeaways

1. Open competition is a growth engine: it lowers prices, improves quality, drives efficiency, and protects consumers. Markets thrive when monopolistic behavior is prevented, incentives reward innovation, and both small and large players can enter on fair, transparent terms.
2. Early-stage startups often fail by ignoring governance. Clear rules around pricing, competitor interaction, financial controls, and internal accountability protect organizations from costly violations, operational chaos, and reputational damage. This makes governance a strategic asset.
3. Scaling too quickly without focus or feasibility destroys value. Sustainable growth requires disciplined planning, commitment to core products, and smart expansion models such as franchising, partnerships, or mergers that reduce risk while preserving capital and operational resilience.
4. AI has redefined competition by shifting power from physical assets to data, networks, and efficiency. Entrepreneurs who ethically leverage data, lower costs through automation, and continuously innovate will outperform incumbents that resist change or rely on price-fixing and complacency.

Takeaways

1. Leadership doubt is a natural consequence of responsibility. The real risk is allowing imagined worst-case scenarios to dominate thinking, leading to hesitation, delayed decisions, and lost momentum.
2. Emotional maturity in leadership is shown through restraint. Choosing when not to react, especially after loss or disappointment, protects teams from blame and turns setbacks into shared learning moments.
3. Pressure signals relevance. High demand, scrutiny, and expectations indicate that the work matters, and leaders who internalise pressure as purpose rather than threat build long-term resilience.
4. Leaders actively rebalance priorities across intense professional cycles, accepting temporary sacrifice in one area to honour responsibility in another.
5. Leadership success is measured by multiplication. Creating capable leaders who go on to outperform you is a more meaningful legacy than personal achievement or recognition.

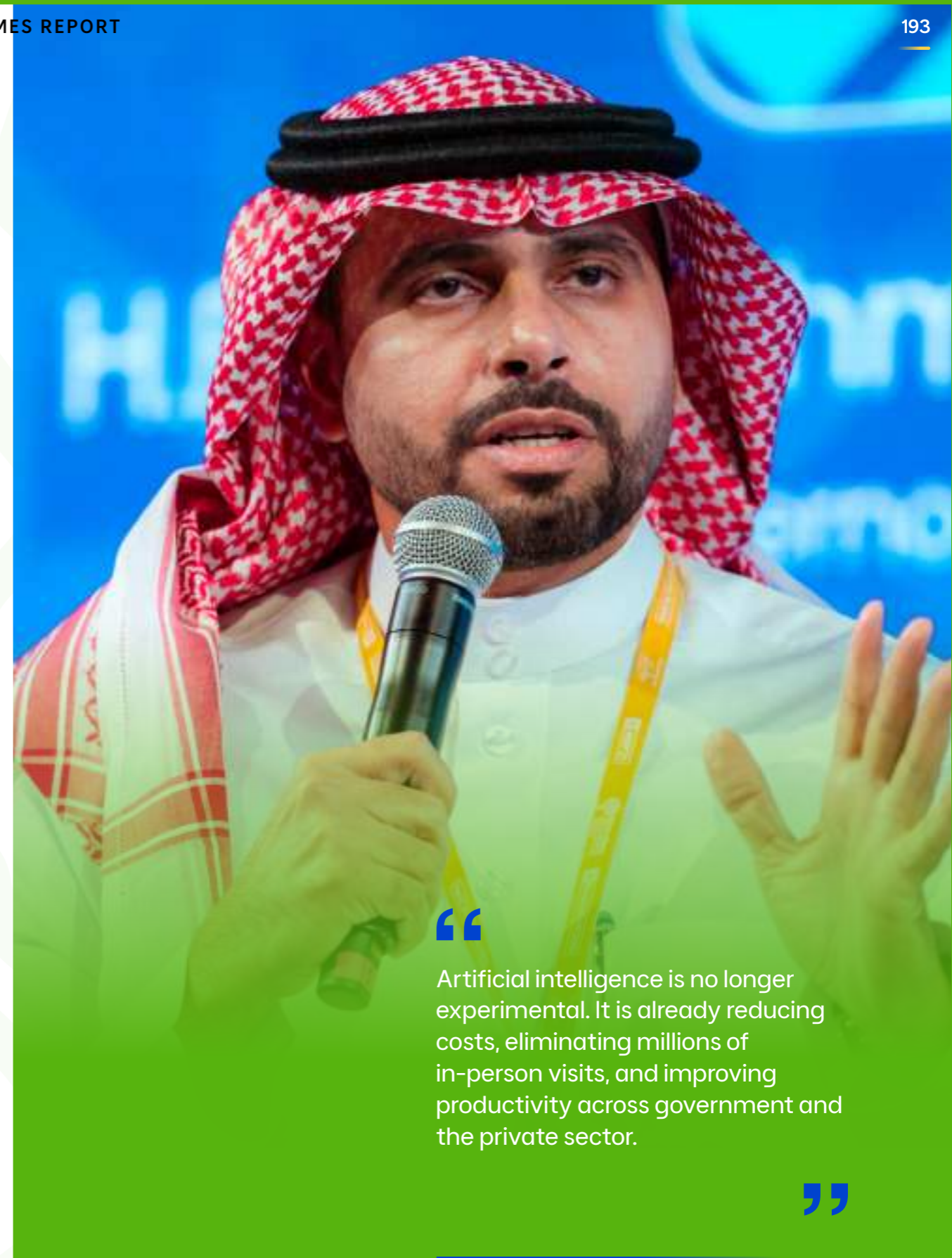

Takeaways

1. The real risk of AI is skill stagnation. History shows that technology reshapes work rather than eliminates it, and those who fail to adopt new tools are the ones most likely to be displaced.
2. AI is no longer a technical specialty. Professions across law, healthcare, education, and finance are already integrating AI tools, making the ability to ask precise questions and guide systems a core professional skill.
3. Governmental use of AI has moved beyond pilots into scaled implementation. When applied to verification, legal drafting, and service delivery, AI has already reduced costs, eliminated millions of in-person visits, and improved the experience of citizens.
4. The true winners in the AI era are not marked by ownership of technology, but by the ability to translate AI into measurable impact. Value creation determines success for individuals, companies, and governments.
5. AI represents a structural shift comparable to previous industrial revolutions, but with one critical difference: machines now participate in decision-making. This fundamentally changes productivity, efficiency, and how value is created across every sector.

1. Leadership capacity is shaped by prolonged exposure to hardship, responsibility, and environments that demand resilience, adaptability, and ethical grounding from a young age.
2. Internal defeat is often more damaging than external obstacles, as negative self-perception and self-doubt can prevent individuals from attempting growth, even when opportunities, support systems, and capability are present.
3. Meaningful leadership emerges through continuous engagement with people across social classes, professions, and life circumstances, as lived interaction develops emotional intelligence, humility, judgment, and an understanding of real societal needs.
4. Failure, rejection, and delayed success are core components of leadership development, forcing reflection, problem-solving, consultation with others, and the refinement of long-term purpose.
5. Sustainable leadership is anchored in service, ethical responsibility, faith, and relational trust, particularly toward parents, community, and vulnerable groups, with success viewed as a responsibility to give back rather than a personal entitlement.

Takeaways

1. Career-defining growth often comes from leaving structured, low-risk environments for roles built on potential rather than certainty, especially when the underlying vision and sectoral trajectory are clear.
2. Bold decisions are informed commitments grounded in belief in the mission, confidence in leadership judgment, and the ability to build capable teams rather than relying on individual expertise alone.
3. Remaining too long within a single function or comfort zone carries its own risk, as narrow experience reduces long-term adaptability, employability, and resilience in the face of organizational or market shocks.
4. Sustainable growth requires disciplined strategy, readiness of capital and people before opportunities arise, and systematic learning from past failures to prevent repeated structural mistakes.
5. Long-term leadership capability is shaped by openness to feedback, continuous self-development, initiative in creating opportunities rather than waiting for them, and the willingness to act while energy and motivation are still high.

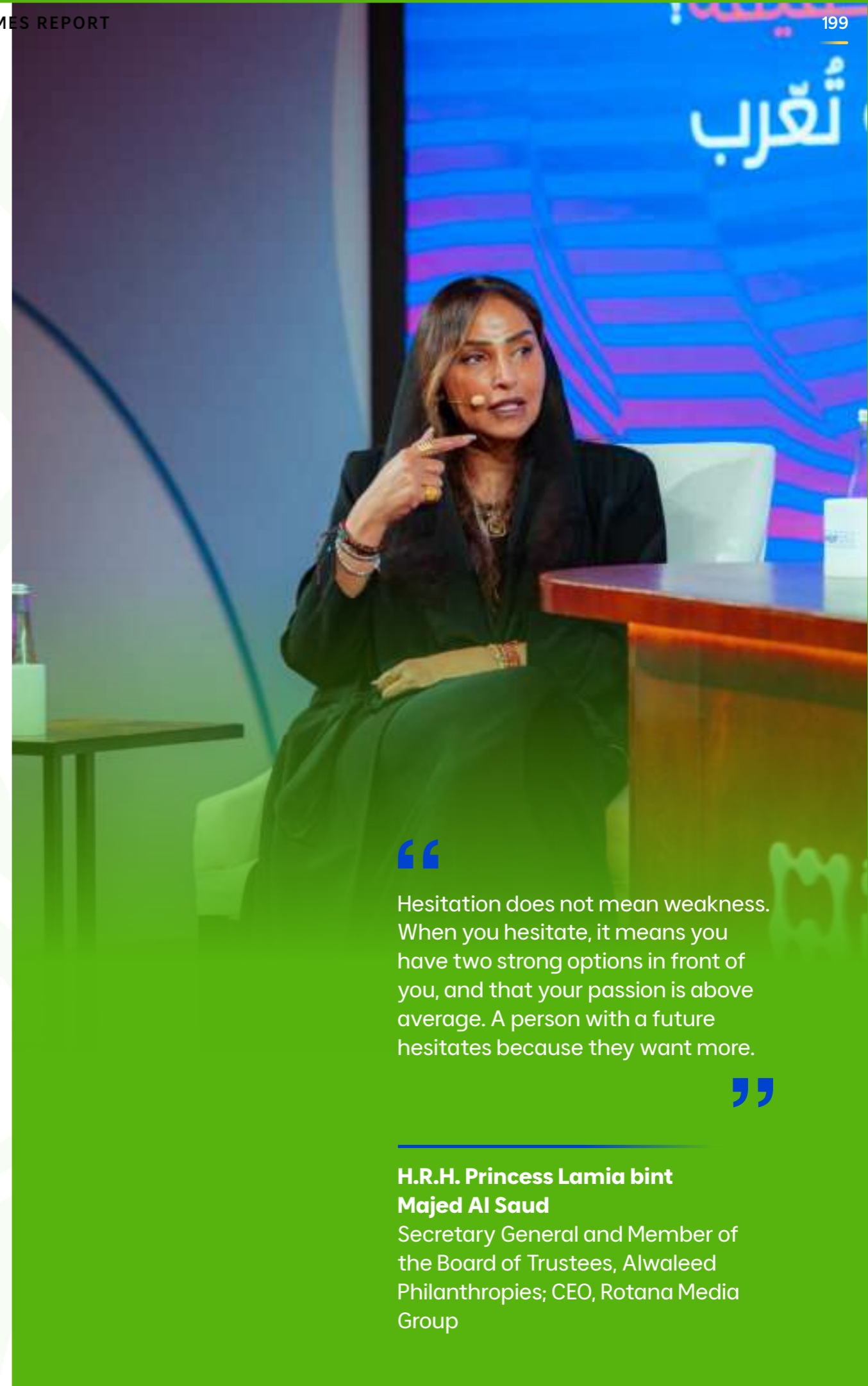

Takeaways

1. Hesitation at the start of a career is an indicator of high ambition, awareness, and multiple viable paths, signaling a desire for depth, meaning, and long-term impact rather than immediate status.
2. Media has shifted from a one-way system of reception to a participatory ecosystem where individuals are creators, distributors, and respondents simultaneously, fundamentally changing power, responsibility, and influence.
3. The decline of traditional media formats does not signal the end of media institutions; it's a flashpoint in the transformation from linear broadcasting toward platform-based storytelling where content quality and narrative relevance remain decisive.
4. Philanthropy is evolving from traditional aid delivery into data-driven, technology-enabled intervention, where research, innovation, and experimentation are essential to achieving scalable and measurable impact.
5. Sustainable leadership requires alignment between passion, purpose, and daily work, as responsibility without emotional commitment leads to burnout, superficial performance, and limited long-term value.

Takeaways

1. Authentic connection across cultures is built by stepping into other people's lived experiences, eschewing external narratives, stereotypes, or official viewpoints.
2. Trust is often created through ordinary, human interactions and hospitality, which can redirect life paths and professional purpose more powerfully than formal ambition or planning.
3. Diplomacy is less about constant transparency and more about judgment, timing, and language that preserves dignity, allows trust to form, and keeps dialogue moving forward.
4. A diplomatic career is a life commitment rather than a job, requiring patience, resilience, genuine curiosity about others, and an acceptance of operating within large institutions and their constraints.
5. In a world shaped by social media and rapid change, meaningful understanding demands going beyond surface-level portrayals and engaging deeply with societies, languages, and people on their own terms.

Un-Scripted Futures



This session brought together a vibrant mix of young changemakers from Saudi Arabia and around the world for real talk, fresh ideas, and creative collaboration. Through interactive challenges, quick-fire discussions, and guided conversations with inspiring “connectors”, leading voices from business, philanthropy, and policy, participants swapped perspectives, sparked new friendships, and explored the big issues shaping their generation. It was a session to connect, be heard, and work with global leaders and innovators to turn shared ideas into action.

Takeaways

1. The traditional link between age and authority is dissolving. Experience is no longer defined by years lived; access to knowledge is now democratized through technology and AI. Youth can learn in minutes what once took decades, shifting the power balance around who is “ready” to lead.
2. Youth empowerment requires acknowledging intersectionality. Barriers such as language, visas, passports, privilege, and representation shape who gets to participate. Real inclusion requires recognizing these layers and using privilege to open doors for others.
3. Hope must be paired with vision, systems awareness, and responsibility. Youth leadership is strengthened when individuals step back, understand the structures they operate within, and commit to giving back through knowledge-sharing and mentorship.
4. Shared responsibility is the bridge from tokenism to real action. Progress happens when leadership and accountability are institutionalized across generations, ensuring youth are active contributors in decision-making spaces.
5. A global shift shows youth are no longer waiting for permission to lead. Across regions, including Africa and the Middle East, young people are shaping narratives, building ventures, and reclaiming their role in defining the future, demonstrating agency rather than dependence on traditional leadership.
6. The modern era values curiosity and capability over titles and credentials. Knowledge is no longer confined to universities or senior positions. The rise of self-taught expertise and digital learning disrupts older hierarchies and opens pathways for broader participation.

From satellites powered by artificial intelligence that track climate change and optimize agriculture, to green propulsion and reusable rockets reducing space debris, technology is driving real environmental impact. Discover how Riyadh and global pioneers are redefining space and AI as forces for sustainability—enabling smarter energy use, cleaner technologies, and stronger climate action. This session spotlighted how youth, scientists, and innovators are using AI-powered rocket science not just to explore new worlds, but to protect our own.

Takeaways

1. AI is collapsing the barrier between raw space data and real-world insight, turning months of satellite analysis into instant, usable intelligence that can inform environmental monitoring, urban planning, disaster response, and everyday decision-making at scale.
2. Space is shifting from symbolic exploration to practical impact, where combining AI with satellite data unlocks downstream applications that directly improve lives, from traffic and agriculture to climate resilience, whilst simultaneously lowering costs and inviting private-sector and SME innovation.
3. The democratization of space data means solving planetary and community challenges no longer requires deep technical training; it requires problem literacy, responsible AI use, and the ability to translate complex signals into actionable solutions.
4. Youth-driven, problem-first thinking revealed how AI and space together can address hyper-local challenges (such as pollution, crowd management, water risk, mobility, and biodiversity), showing that the future of space innovation is collaborative, applied, and grounded in human needs.

This fast, high-energy lab turned real moments into a bold leadership principle for participants to practice and share. They sprinted in pairs to swap stories, spot the strengths that keep showing up, and craft a one-line lesson the world can learn from. Then we published people's lines to a live Saudi leadership wall and a digital takeaway. Attendees left with a named strength, a clear principle in their own words, and a simple plan to use it in school, at work, and in your community.

Takeaways

1. Leadership in the Arab world blends vision with values, showing that influence is rooted in authority, but also belief, hospitality, diversity, and leading by example, shaping how people act, aspire, and see themselves as leaders.
2. There is a clear gap in global leadership narratives: Arab leadership is underrepresented, often studied from the outside. Capturing lived experiences and stories from the region is essential to redefine leadership models and contribute original, values-driven perspectives to the world.
3. Self-perception shapes leadership impact. Confidence, presence, and the decision to step forward influence how voices are heard and roles are claimed, especially for underrepresented groups. This turns internal belief into outward authority and visible leadership.
4. Future Saudi leadership is defined by ambition without limits, curiosity, service, and care for others. The leaders who endure are those who dream boldly, work tirelessly for their people, and create inclusive environments where everyone feels welcomed and empowered.



Human Skills In A Tech Age

Where do you fit in the AI revolution? This fast-paced interactive session challenged the myth that the future belongs only to tech jobs. Participants tested how machine learning reshapes tasks rather than replacing whole roles, examine rising demand across various key sectors, then completed a variety of challenges designed to increase employability in this brave new world. Closing with dot voting and personal commitments, this session gave participants practical actions, new confidence, and a clearer view of where their strengths lie in a human-meets-AI economy.

Takeaways

1. Human-centred professions will outlast AI. Philosophy, psychology, medicine, and science require qualities machines cannot replicate: emotional intuition, empathy, ethical reasoning, trust, and creative scientific thinking.
2. Clearly classifying tasks helps us understand AI's role in work. By categorizing tasks as ones AI can replace, assist with, or cannot perform, we gain clarity on integrating AI effectively into work.
3. Complexity determines what AI can and cannot replace. AI can efficiently handle simpler, repeatable tasks, but ones requiring deeper thinking, emotional understanding, cross-domain reasoning, and human judgment demand greater human involvement.
4. Individuals can rely on four employability strategies to remain competitive: mastering their craft, developing broad generalist capabilities, driving innovation through original thinking, and leveraging uniquely human empathy and trust-building.
5. Choose your career by looking inward instead of predicting the future. Forecasts can't guide our career choices. The most reliable approach is to understand ourselves: identify natural capabilities that bring genuine enjoyment.

Takeaways

1. Writing or speaking freely helps surface buried thoughts and regulate emotions, often delivering more clarity than formal advice. Externalizing inner dialogue assigns emotions their true weight and reveals answers people already carry but struggle to trust.
2. Being heard matters more than being advised. Non-judgmental spaces, whether in support groups, mentoring conversations, or peer dialogue, unlock insight by allowing people to articulate uncertainty aloud, turning confusion into direction through questions rather than solutions.
3. Overthinking decisions often signals a need for confirmation. Talking through choices with the right listener helps validate intuition, distinguish fear from misalignment, and clarify whether hesitation stems from external pressure, financial anxiety, or genuine lack of fit.
4. Growth requires re-evaluating relationships, careers, and identities as interests evolve. Letting go of misaligned environments, experimenting step-by-step, and making space for new circles or side paths restores energy, reinforces agency, and creates momentum without forcing abrupt or irreversible change.

The business environment is overloaded with competing voices and opinions. Instead of adding to the noise, this session showed how emerging leaders can stand out and build genuine influence by acting and communicating authentically, from a strong foundation of their own values and purpose. Drawing on leadership coaching and real-world experience, attendees learned practical tools from experienced heads to connect personal values with professional goals. In turn, this empowered them to communicate with confidence, assess their leadership styles and emotional intelligence, and identify the valuable traits they could develop to unlock their power.

Takeaways

1. Leadership moves from management to inspiration when people emotionally connect to the mission. Simple, authentic conversations, such as asking what excites someone and listening, help individuals see their role as meaningful, increasing ownership, engagement, and commitment beyond tasks, titles, or hierarchies.
2. Authenticity is alignment with values while adapting behavior to context. Effective leaders experiment with different personas as situations evolve, accepting discomfort as growth, and understanding that what enabled early success must often change to meet new responsibilities.
3. Sustained leadership in high-pressure environments requires intentional reflection. Brief daily check-ins like focusing on learning, team engagement, and improvement anchor leaders amid rapid change, prevent burnout, and reframe challenges as opportunities to grow influence through awareness rather than constant reaction.
4. Trust and authority grow through vulnerability. Admitting mistakes, saying “I don’t know,” and holding integrity alongside organizational goals create psychological safety, strengthen credibility, and allow leaders to balance progress with values using a “yes, and” mindset.

Great mentors don't just guide, they amplify. In this powerful personal-development session, attendees learned how to connect with their perfect role models in real life to build the confidence and resilience to succeed—and how to turn their own growth into a platform for others. Amar Abbas (Youth Action UK) and Jana Yamani (Project1932) offered a host of real-world stories from youth programmes and mentorship networks to explore how young people can connect, learn and lead, and how small acts of guidance can spark large-scale impact. Because every leader's legacy starts with who they lift.

Takeaways

1. Mentorship is a long-term relationship rooted in honesty, trust, and commitment, where time, consistency, and mutual respect turn guidance into real transformation rather than short-term advice.
2. The most effective mentorship multiplies impact: mentees grow into mentors, creating ripple effects across sectors and generations that strengthen capacity building, leadership pipelines, and broader economic participation.
3. Finding the right mentor starts with clarity of purpose and values, recognizing mentors already around you, and having the courage to ask, knowing that discomfort, challenge, and humility are essential to real growth.
4. Mentorship is evolving from one-to-one guidance into structured yet flexible ecosystems, combining professional, personal, and social goals, and expanding into forums that scale shared learning and collective progress.

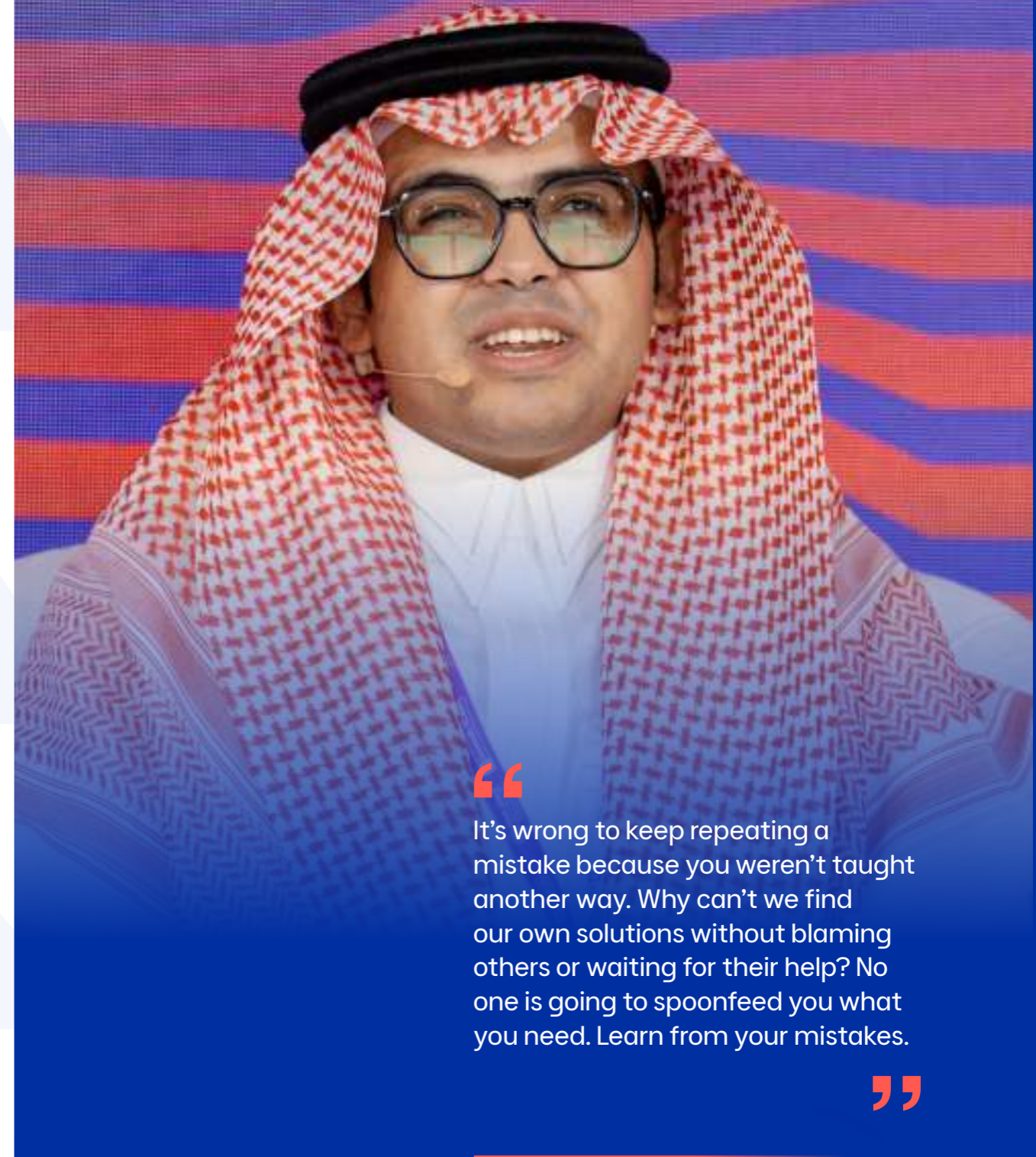

Takeaways

1. Play-based learning lowers fear and raises capability: when experimentation replaces punishment, students persist longer, adapt faster, and turn “hard” subjects into accessible pathways for creativity, science, and real-world problem solving.
2. Small, curiosity-driven projects can scale into national and global impact when students are encouraged to try early, iterate through mistakes, and lead collaboratively, proving that momentum often begins with a single question and sustained effort.
3. Inclusive education requires systems that adapt to students. Respectful language, accessible design, and proactive self-advocacy remove barriers early, allowing talent (including students with special needs) to participate, contribute, and progress equally.
4. Long-term success requires beliefs: family support, protected time to explore interests, and exposure beyond classrooms help young people discover direction, build confidence, and shape their own futures rather than waiting for predefined paths.

Takeaways

1. Global scale begins with deep local insight. The strongest ventures identify real community problems, design solutions within local constraints, and turn them into clear business cases. Starting small is how credibility, relevance, and long-term scalability are built.
2. Sustainable growth depends on partnerships that are mutually value-adding. When initiatives align with government agendas, private-sector incentives, and community needs, they move from passion projects to institutionalized models that attract sponsors, policymakers, and global recognition.
3. Youth-led ventures scale faster when young people are treated as experts. Building domain expertise, owning one's place at decision-making tables, and confidently translating grassroots experience into policy and strategy unlocks influence beyond borders.
4. Technology accelerates scale when paired with collaboration. Digital tools, AI, and remote work lower barriers from ideation to execution, but global impact comes from combining these tools with local knowledge, cross-border partnerships, and relentless experimentation.

What does next-gen diplomacy look like in an interconnected age where ideas and influence cross borders instantly? Guests joined Ahmed Al Teraifi (Bahraini Chief of Arab and African Affairs) to explore how young people can move from being passive observers of international affairs to active participants in global dialogue. Through stories from the field and lessons from the world stage, they uncovered the power of cultural intelligence, built the negotiation skills and courage to be active advocates, and learned ambassadorial strategies to create a credible voice for yourself, and your community.

Takeaways

1. Diplomacy is no longer confined to institutions; it is fundamentally human and humanitarian, rooted in reconciliation, aid, and peace-building. In a hyperconnected world, individuals, creators, and communities increasingly shape international influence through everyday actions and shared values.
2. Technology amplifies diplomatic reach, but does not supplant humanity. Algorithms, platforms, and social media accelerate message delivery, yet trust, empathy, and ethical communication remain decisive in resolving conflict and sustaining long-term international relationships.
3. Influence today depends on smart power: combining security and economic strength with culture, identity, and values. Soft power, expressed through language, art, sports, and storytelling, often travels faster and resonates more deeply than formal political mechanisms.
4. Youth influence begins with knowledge, courage, and responsibility. Accessing credible information, learning from others' experiences, and engaging openly across borders enables individuals in any field to act as ambassadors, contributing meaningfully to shared global challenges.



Literature, art, and music are powerful tools for building global diplomatic influence and strength. We must showcase how young people across the Arab world can shape outcomes and make a real impact without having to be official diplomats.

Welcome to the Imagination Economy—where creativity is the new cultural currency, and digital platforms let ideas become reality faster than ever. In a world now overflowing with tools and tech, anyone can launch products, media or movements. But with so much content in the mix, which skills will be most valuable? Participants watched a high-voltage panel to crack the code of next-gen creativity, exploring how AI and digital tech are transforming the way young people create, build, and connect.

Takeaways

1. Creation has been radically democratized: with AI collapsing production barriers, Gen Z is shifting from consumers to creators at unprecedented speed. What now differentiates impact has become the clarity of ideas, cultural perspective, and the ability to translate imagination into meaning.
2. The emerging Imagination Economy rewards creativity as capital. As execution becomes automated, success depends less on technical mastery and more on originality, storytelling, and knowing what to create, drawing from identity, heritage, and lived experience rather than purely from technology.
3. Saudi Arabia is positioning youth, culture, and AI as a unified growth engine. By treating heritage as an active economic asset and aligning education, regulation, and creative industries, the country is enabling young people to lead innovation while preserving and reinterpreting national identity.
4. The real competitive edge lies in ownership, persistence, and early action. Those who start experimenting now, iterating through failure, building confidence, and learning how to learn, gain compounding advantages as tools evolve, while equal access and cross-sector collaboration determine how widely this opportunity scales.

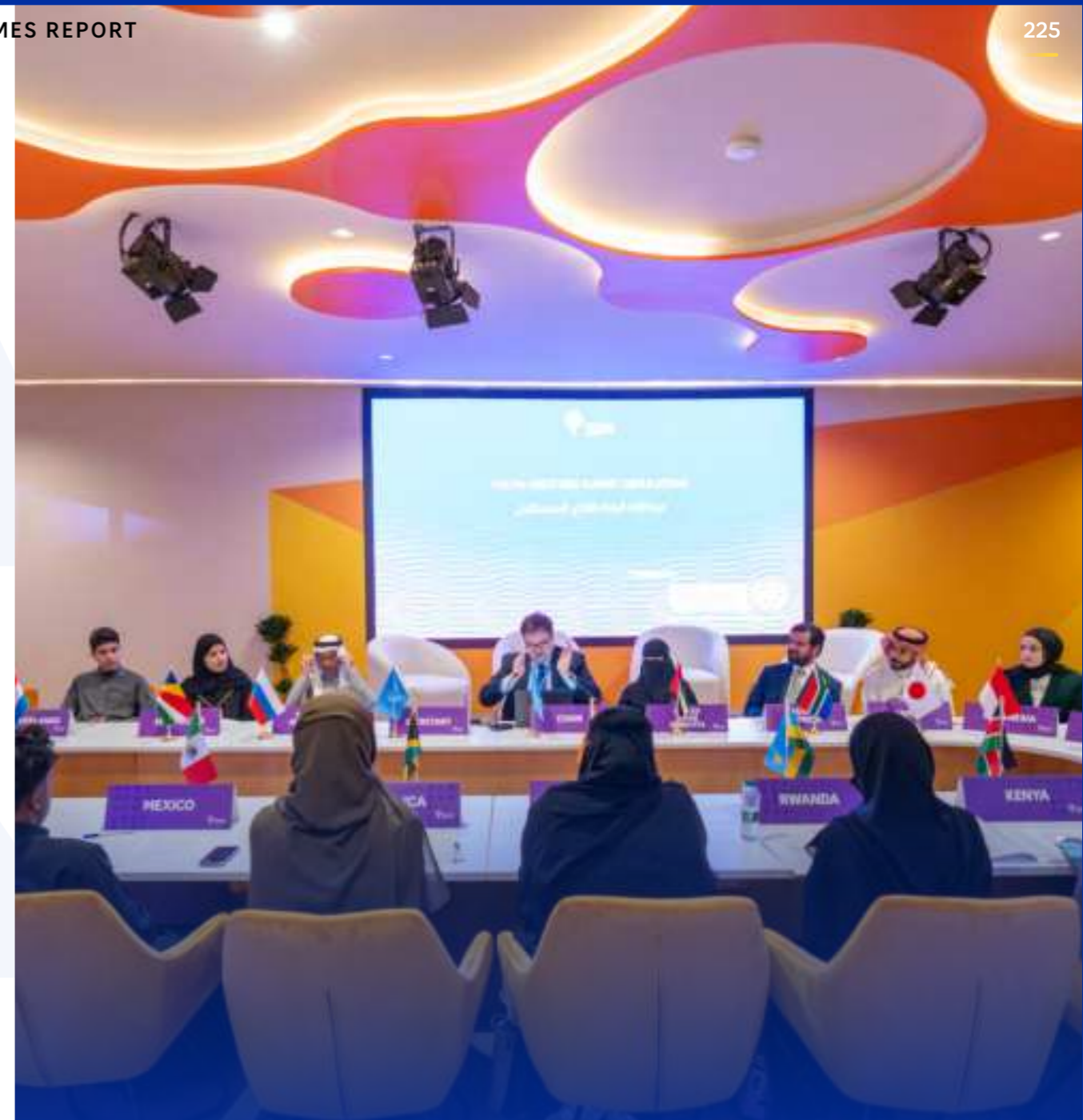

What does it take for youth-led projects to move from local beginnings to global influence? Guests attended a powerhouse panel of social innovators and impact strategists to uncover how young leaders can spark real change. It dove into stories and strategies behind successful ventures, from community empowerment and policy advocacy to innovative partnerships that cross borders, and attendees walked away with actionable insights to scale ideas, build meaningful collaborations, and accelerate youth-led transformation from your hometown to the wider world.

Takeaways

1. The exercise is a hands-on UN simulation where students adopt assigned country roles, study briefing packets in silence, craft 30-second statements, and amend a zero-draft resolution line by line. This mirrors how consensus-based UN decisions are actually forged.
2. National interests drive divergent positions. Fishing-reliant states demand strong anti-plastic rules, while industrial powers favor gradual, sustainability-focused measures that protect economies. Agreement is difficult even on widely recognized environmental harms.
3. Negotiation mechanics are central. Delegates propose adding, deleting, replacing, or retaining edits; debate wording and placement; and surface measures such as biodegradable alternatives, taxes on single-use plastics, financing, awareness, and community empowerment, all while avoiding formal votes.
4. Frictions reveal the politics of ambition. Calls for strict phase-out timelines and transparency clash with preferences for softer language, showing governments' desire for flexibility and the difficulty of setting quantifiable, enforceable goals.
5. UN decision-making is slower and tougher than it seems. Diverse and often conflicting priorities must be reconciled under time pressure to reach a middle ground that is equitable, science-informed, and practically implementable.

How to be agents of impact in this world in a responsible way

1. Design for scale. Build social ventures as systems with repeatable models, clear ownership, resilient revenue, and measurable outcomes. In this way, their impact is sustainable, outliving funding cycles and initial hype.
2. Turn community needs into viable business cases. Start with deep local listening, then create solutions from the problems identified, aligning social value and partner priorities with economic incentives and policy goals.
3. Match purpose with execution discipline. Earn trust by mastering market validation, financial fundamentals, clear storytelling, and operational focus. Impact grows when mission is backed by professional delivery.
4. Build inclusion into the blueprint. Treat accessibility, gender equity, and diverse participation as design inputs from day one to unlock new markets, stronger solutions, and broader social returns.
5. Develop ecosystems. Accelerate impact by leveraging mentors, institutions, corporates, policymakers, and digital tools to create systems, markets, and behaviors collectively.

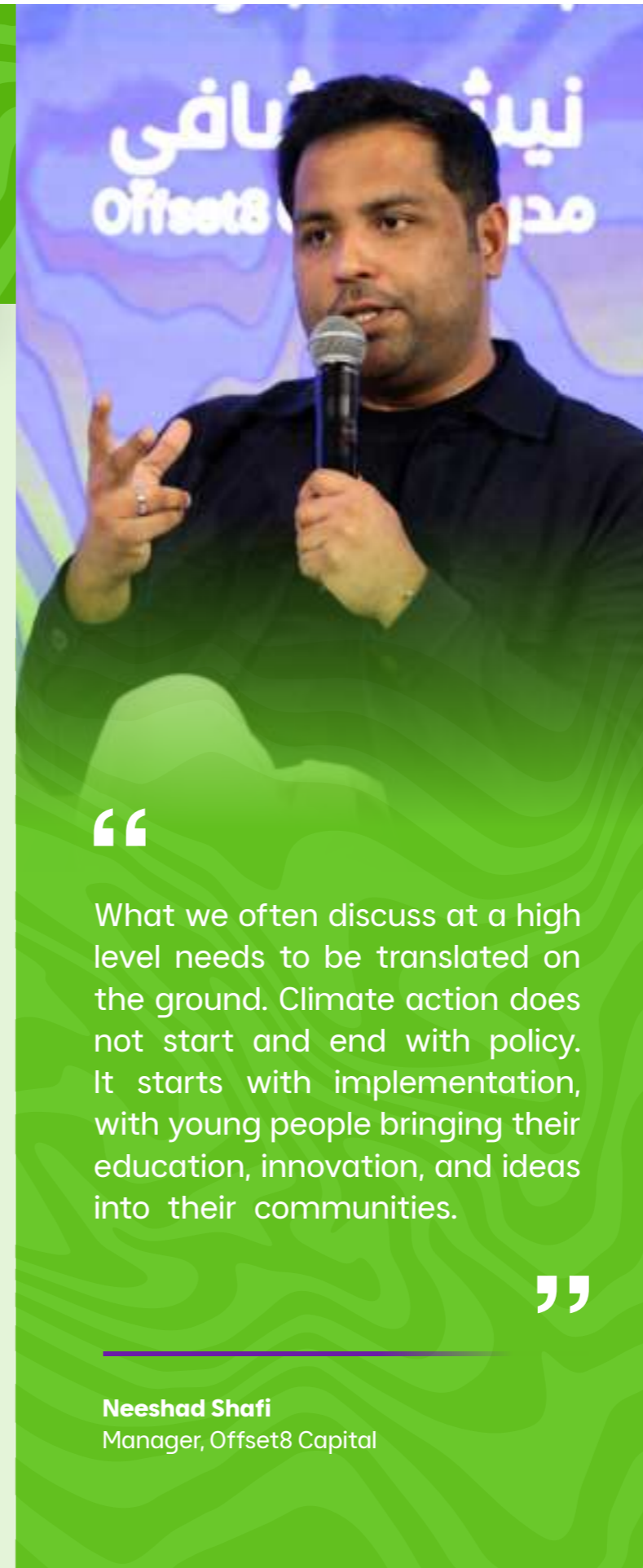

How to ensure sustainability is a core component of every endeavor you take on

1. Design sustainability into systems. Embed environmental goals directly into food, mobility, finance, and technology, so that the effects scale through value.
2. Build for place. Design climate solutions around local geography, culture, and resources. Context-specific innovation outperforms one-size-fits-all sustainability models.
3. Shift from ideas to deployment. Focus on building tools, infrastructure, and policies that remove friction, align incentives, and make sustainable choices economically viable at scale.
4. Pair technology with trust. Use AI and data to turn sustainability into measurable outcomes, so emissions reduction and biodiversity become accountable assets.
5. Operate across community and policy. Combine grassroots action with policy literacy to inform standards, financing, and regulations that lead to sustainable success.

Global Engagement Sessions



How to be a global citizen and seek impactful projects that solve real-world problems

1. Move from presence to responsibility. Prepare youth to draw on lived national experience for negotiation and solutions that work across cultures and policy settings.
2. Use authenticity as leverage. Global engagement sprouting from real stories and culture build trust, alignment, and partnerships that travel without losing local identity.
3. Build communities in lieu of audiences. Design spaces for collaboration and shared purpose where youth co-create, participate, and earn influence through contribution, not through authority.
4. Create systems for influence. Use simulations, councils, and intergenerational platforms to train youth through repeated exposure to real decision-making and institutional complexity.
5. Shift from adopting to exporting policy. Equip regional youth to share tried-and-true models, leadership values, and soft-power that curate global norms.

Emerging Tech Sessions



How technology can be a tool to find solutions and create value strategically

1. Design for systems. Build emerging tech by integrating data, hardware, governance, and human judgment. Value now comes from synchronizing ecosystems. Avoid chasing isolated breakthroughs.
2. Redesign workflows around AI. Use AI to augment tasks, save time, and cut costs. Sustainable advantage comes from embedding AI into daily operations.
3. Treat data as infrastructure. Invest in data governance, ethics, and sovereignty alongside innovation. Long-term tech success depends on fair access, regulation, and responsible data power.
4. Invest in human advantage. Develop the skills AI can't replace, like judgment, empathy, creativity, and cross-domain thinking. Leaders who pair technical fluency with human depth perform exceptionally.
5. Build from real problems. Anchor innovation in lived challenges. Don't rely on trends. Test early and design for real-world adoption to scale emerging tech effectively.

How to build resilience and strength to achieve sustainable success

1. Train wellness like performance. Build emotional regulation and self-awareness into daily routines to extend performance, sustain focus under pressure, and maximize talent over time.
2. Reframe failure as feedback. Setbacks are opportunities to adjust strategy, not identity. Faster recovery and psychological resilience come from treating pressure as information, as opposed to opportunity for self-reproach.
3. Use prevention to avoid burnout. Prioritize sleep, focus, reflection, and emotional hygiene early. High performance lasts longer when stress is paced so it avoids becoming damaging.
4. Invest in support systems. Use coaching and peer dialogue as mental infrastructure to regulate emotions and decisions, and sustain motivation through long performance cycles.
5. Practice adaptive strength. Build vulnerability and self-reflection into growth and recalibration. Authenticity and flexibility now define resilience in sport, leadership, and life.

How to employ storytelling and innovation to inspire cultural narratives and social cohesion

1. Treat arts and culture as infrastructure. Use storytelling and heritage as creative expression to strengthen identity and social cohesion to global audiences during periods of rapid change.
2. Innovate by reinterpreting instead of replacing. Activate heritage and lived experience through contemporary tools to evolve culture, all while preserving authenticity and collective memory.
3. Let technology scale creation. Use AI and digital platforms to lower barriers, but base impact on emotional truth, narrative clarity, and culture.
4. Shift institutions from preserving to enabling. Empower youth to reinterpret cultural narratives, turning heritage into a living process.
5. Build creative careers on conviction. Prioritize originality and cross-disciplinary fluency over imitation. Long-term creative value comes from being unique, not production scale.

MGF25 Demonstrated the Impact of Being #CreatedByYouth

1 Youth engagement shifted from participation to ownership at MGF25. They designed solutions, ventures, and platforms that address real societal, economic, and technological challenges.

2 Creation was framed as a process rooted in experimentation, where iteration, learning from failure, and continuous refinement were treated as essential steps toward meaningful impact.

3 Young creators showed the ability to translate personal passion and lived experience into scalable models that combine purpose, sustainability, and measurable results.

4 Insights highlighted that youth-driven creation thrives when supported by systems that provide access to tools, mentorship, funding pathways, and institutional collaboration.

5 The forum outcomes revealed that creation extends beyond products and startups to include narratives, communities, and cultural frameworks that shape identity and collective progress.

6 Youth creation emerged as a long-term national investment, strengthening leadership pipelines, innovation capacity, and the resilience of future economic and social systems.

From Dialogue to Doing: A Youth-Driven Call to Action

1 Empower youth to move from ideas to execution by expanding access to prototyping tools, mentorship, and early-stage funding that enable experimentation and real-world testing.

2 Embed collaboration into every stage of creation by incentivizing cross-sector, cross-discipline, and cross-border partnerships that combine local insight with global expertise.

3 Redesign education to reward experimentation and problem-solving, treating failure as a learning signal and positioning classrooms as launchpads for real-world innovation.

4 Build sustainable pathways that combine both social and commercial impact, ensuring youth-led initiatives integrate revenue models, impact measurement, and governance structures from the early stages of a project.

5 Center inclusion and accessibility in all youth-driven initiatives, ensuring that technology, culture, entrepreneurship, and wellbeing solutions are designed for diverse abilities, backgrounds, and communities.

6 Strengthen trust between youth and institutions by opening decision-making spaces, co-creating policy frameworks, and recognizing youth as contributors and experts.

7 Commit to long-term ecosystems, eschewing one-off interventions, to transform temporary momentum into sustainable networks that support continuous creation, learning, and collaboration.
